



In January, 258,000 unemployed jobseekers






At the end of January, a total of 258,000 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. This is 15,700 fewer than a year earlier, and 2,400 fewer than the previous month. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 9.8% of the labour force, which is 0.6 percentage points less than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

Trends:

- Total number of all jobseekers decreased by 83,400
- The number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 15,700 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off decreased by 6,800
- Services included in the activation rate had 2,600 more people than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies decreased by 10,400 from the previous year




The total number of jobseekers decreased

At the end of January, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 480,400, down 83,400 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 249,900 were men and 230,500 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 37,600 and the number of women by 45,800. Of the jobseekers, 235,500, or 3,600 less than a year earlier, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment.

Of the jobseekers, 123,400 were employed: 67,100 of them were in full-time work, 36,500 were in part-time work and 19,800 were employed through the services organised by the employment and economic development administration and local government pilots on employment. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 92,600, of whom 24,300 were in services promoting employment and 54,000 in training. Of the jobseekers, 258,000 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 15,700 less than the year before. In January, 22,400 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 1,200 less than in December. The number of people fully laid off decreased by 6,800 from January a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 6,300, representing a decrease of 2,500 from the year before.


Unemployed jobseekers



Decrease in unemployed jobseekers in January

At the end of January, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 258,000, down 15,700 on the previous year. Compared with December, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 2,400. Of the unemployed jobseekers, 140,400, or 4,300 fewer than in January a year ago, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 19,700 in January, up 2,000 from January a year ago. In January, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 46,300, representing a decrease of 2,000 on the year before. The number of starting periods of unemployment decreased by 1,900 from December. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered from the existing groups of jobseekers.

The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 35,800, up 4,900 from January a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 9,400 at the end of January, down 300 from the year before.




In January, 22,400 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 1,200 less than in December. The number of people fully laid off decreased by 6,800 from January a year earlier. In January, the number of job searches among those fully laid off totalled 4,000, representing a decrease of 1,200 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 11,400, down 3,000 from January a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs decreased by 2,100 from December. Examined by occupation, the number of people fully laid off increased in four groups and decreased in six groups. The number of people fully laid off increased the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (900) and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (400). The number of people fully laid off decreased the most in the groups of service and sales workers (-6,300), elementary occupations (-800), office and customer service workers (-500) and technicians and associate professionals (-500). The number of laid-off people remained unchanged in the groups of armed forces.


Unemployment decreased in the areas of almost all ELY Centres

Compared to the same period in the previous year, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in January in the areas of almost all Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres); the most in Uusimaa (-9%), South Savo (-9%), Pirkanmaa (-9%), Häme (-8%), Southeast Finland (-6%), Lapland (-6%) and Southwest Finland (-6%). The number of unemployed jobseekers increased only in North Ostrobothnia (6%) and Ostrobothnia (2%). The number of unemployed jobseekers fell the most in Åland, by 21%. Compared with December, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in the areas of eleven ELY Centres; the most in South Ostrobothnia (-6%), Ostrobothnia (-3%), Southwest Finland (-2%), Satakunta (-2%) and Central Finland (-2%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased 4% from December.

Unemployed jobseekers and jobs vacant in Employment and Economic Development Office by ELY centre



Unemployment decreased more among women than men


Of the unemployed jobseekers, 152,100 (59%) were men and 105,900 (41%) were women, indicating an increase of 800 for men and a decrease of 3,200 for women from the figures for December. Compared with January a year ago, unemployment decreased by 7,100 (-4%) among men and by 8,600 (-7%) among women.



Unemployment decreased in almost all age groups

At the end of January, unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age numbered 27,400, representing a decrease of 2,600 from January a year ago. Youth unemployment decreased from December by 700. For those under 20, the number of unemployed was 5,100. Among those over 50, the number of unemployed was 95,500, representing a decrease of 9,600 on the year before. Among those over 55, the number of unemployed was 70,100, representing a decrease of 7,100 on the year before. Unemployment decreased the most among those over 60 (-11%), those between 50 and 54 (-9%) and those under 25 (-9%). Among those between 30 and 34, unemployment increased by 1%. Compared with December, unemployment decreased in all age groups, with the exception of those between 55 and 59 years (1%). Unemployment fell the most from December among those under 20 (-11%).


Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group



Unemployment decreased at eight levels of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment decreased from January last year at all levels of education, with the exception of those with level of education 'unknown' whose unemployment increased by 14%. Unemployment decreased the most among those with lower level basic qualifications (-22%), post-secondary non-tertiary education (-15%), lowest level of tertiary education (-13%) and doctorate or equivalent level tertiary education (-9%). Unemployment decreased the least among those with lower-degree level tertiary education (-2%) and higher-degree level tertiary education (-3%).


UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS by occupational group



Unemployment decreased in almost all occupational groups

Examined by occupation, unemployment decreased in almost all groups from January the previous year; the most in the groups of service and sales workers (-7,100), technicians and associate professionals (-1,800), office and customer service workers (-1,700), professionals (-1,300), and elementary occupations (-1,300). Unemployment decreased the least in the occupational groups of plant and machine operators, and assemblers (-200) and skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers (-400). Unemployment remained unchanged in the group of armed forces

LONG-TERM UNEMPLOYED




Decrease in long-term unemployment

At the end of January, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 85,900, down 20,100 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 52,200 were men and 33,600 were women. The number of men decreased by 11,300 (-18%) from the previous year and the number of women by 8,800 (-21%). Long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than two years numbered 50,400, which is 1,200 less than a year ago.



Services




Increase in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of January, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 111,500, up 2,600 on the previous year. Compared with December, the number of persons covered by such services increased by 4,300. Of those covered by services, 63,200 were customers of the local government pilots, which is 3,700 more than in January last year. The activation rate at the end of January was 30.2%, which is 1.7 percentage points higher than a year earlier. In all, 4.0% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 53,000, up 1,300 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 58,500, also up 1,300 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 369,500 at the end of January. This is 13,100 fewer than a year earlier. The decrease in broad unemployment was due to a decrease in the number of unemployed.

04 Other(private person)


The number of placements increased in local government and the private sector

At the end of January, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the State or receiving start-up grants totalled 34,200, which is 5,700 more than the year before. Of those in placements, 1% were in central government jobs, 26% in local government jobs and 73% in the private sector. Since January last year, the number of placements had increased by 23% in local government jobs and by 19% in the private sector, but decreased by 1% in central government jobs. Of those in placements, 52% were men. Placements for men increased by 3,200, and those for women by 2,500 from the previous year.

in target profession at the end of the month




Increase in the number of persons in labour market training

At the end of January, labour market training was attended by 21,300 students, up 1,100 on the previous year. Of the students, 9,700 were men and 11,700 were women. The number of men decreased by 100 and the number of women rose by 1,200 from January last year. During January, 6,300 new students began labour market training, representing an increase of 1,300 on the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' were people in integration training (7,600), which is 900 more than the year before.

at the end of the month and during the previous year




The number of persons in training increased

At the end of January, 1,800 persons were in training, which is 400 more than the year before. Of those in training, 900 were men and 800 were women. Career coaching had 1,100 participants in January, which is 300 more than a year earlier. The number of people receiving job search training was 700, which is 100 more than the previous year.

in person's profession at the end of the month




The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year

Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 26,300 people, representing a decrease of 4,400 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 10,000, down 1,900 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 16,300, representing a decrease of 2,500 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 8,300 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 700 on the previous year.

at the end of the month and during the previous year by sector




The number of job alternation substitutes increased

A total of 3,700 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of January, which is 200 more than a year earlier. Of the substitutes, 1,300 were men and 2,400 were women. The number of men increased by 100 and the number of women likewise by 100 from the previous year.

REHABILITATIVE WORK ACTIVITIES

Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 17,900 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of January, which is 900 less than a year earlier. Of the participants 10,100 were men and 7,800 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 500 and the number of women by 400.

Participation in work and training trials increased

Work and training trials had a total of 6,200 participants at the end of January, which is 500 more than the year before. Of the participants, 3,100 were men and 3,200 were women. The number of men increased by 200 and the number of women also by 200 from the previous year.

Decrease in the number of new vacancies

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment during January totalled 114,700, which is 10,400 fewer than in January last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies in January was 176,500, which is 31,600 fewer than a year ago. A total of 11,100 of these vacancies were filled during January, 2,500 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 46,900 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number of applicants. In addition, a total of 11,600 vacancies were cancelled and 1,500 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at Employment and Economic Development Offices and in local government pilots at the end of January was 109,500, down 16,800 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had decreased for six occupational groups; the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (-4,800), technicians and associate professionals (-3,100), plant and machine operators, and assemblers (-2,100) and office and customer service workers (-1,700). The number of new vacancies increased the most in the group of service and sales workers (1,300).

Information about the website

On this website you will find the latest statistics from the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment's monthly Employment Bulletin. You can access a .pdf version of the current and previous months' Employment Bulletin by following the link on the right. The Employment Bulletin is based on the data from the MEAE's Employment Service Statistics. The Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment compiles statistics on the clients of the Employment and economic development offices (TE offices), including registered job-seekers, labour market policy services, and job vacancies reported to TE offices by employers. The data is collected from the customer service registry (URA) used by the TE offices. This means that the data used by MEAE Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based. The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the aforementioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
