In September 315,800 unemployed jobseekers






A total of 315,800 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices at the end of September. This is 89,700 more than a year earlier. The number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 13,900 from the previous month. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 12.0% of the labour force, which is 3.4 percentage points more than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

Trends:

- Total number of jobseekers increased by 143,000
- The number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 90,000 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off increased by 48,000
- Services included in the activation rate had 6,000 less people than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies decreased by 7,000 from last year





The total number of jobseekers increased

At the end of September, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices totalled 658,500, up 143,000 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 334,900 were men and 323,600 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men increased by 80,000 and the number of women by 63,000.

Of the jobseekers, 211,000 were employed, 191,700 of them were on the open labour market and 19,300 were employed through the services of the employment and economic development administration. The number of job seekers on the open labour market increased by 47,300 from September a year earlier. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 114,900, of whom 26,700 in services promoting employment and 65,800 were in training. Of the jobseekers, 315,800 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 89,700 more than the year before. In September, 56,700 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 4,200 less than in August. The number of people fully laid off increased by 48,400 from September a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 16,900, representing an increase of 11,600 from the year before.

Increase in unemployed jobseekers in September

At the end of September, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices totalled 315,800, up 89,700 on the previous year. The number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 13,900 from August. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 15,600, down 600 from September a year ago. In September, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 54,600 representing an increase of 8,700 on the year before. The number of commencing periods of unemployment increased by 400 from August. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered form the existing groups of jobseekers.


The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 33,100, up 9,500 from September a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 10,400 at the end of September, up 4,100 from the year before.

In September, 56,700 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 4,200 less than in August. The number of people fully laid off increased by 48,400 from September a year earlier. In September, the number of job searches among the fully laid off people totalled 4,600 representing an increase of 3,300 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 21,900, up 17,000 from September a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs decreased by 300 from August. The number of people fully laid off increased in all occupational groups; the greatest increases were in the groups of 'unknown' (10,400), service and sales workers (10,300), craft and related trades workers (6,800), and professionals (5,100).


Unemployment increased in the areas of all ELY Centres

Compared to the same period in the previous year, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased in September in the areas of all Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres); the most in Uusimaa (62%), Ostrobothnia (49%), Southwest Finland (44%) and Pirkanmaa (40%). The number of unemployed jobseekers increased the least in Kainuu (1%), South Savo (17%), North Karelia (18%), Southeast Finland (20%) and Central Finland (20%). In the Åland Islands, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 177 per cent. Compared to August, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in the areas of all Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres); the most in South Ostrobothnia (-7%) and Ostrobothnia (-7%).

Unemployed jobseekers and jobs vacant in Employment and Economic Development Office by ELY centre



Unemployment increased more among men than women


Of the unemployed jobseekers, 178,400 (56%) were men and 137,400 (44%) were women, indicating a decrease of 4,600 for men and 9,400 for women from the figures for August. Compared with September a year ago, unemployment increased by 52,000 (41%) among men and by 37,800 (38%) among women.



Unemployment increased in all age groups

At the end of September, unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age numbered 38,100, representing an increase of 10,200 from September a year ago. Youth unemployment decreased from August by 3,900. For those under 20, the number of unemployed was 8,400. Among those over 50, the number of unemployed was 113,500, representing an increase of 27,300 on the year before. Among those over 55, the number of unemployed was 79,000, representing an increase of 18,000 on the year before. Proportionally, unemployment increased most in the age group 25–44 (on average 47%) and those over 64 (78%). Compared to August, unemployment decreased in all age groups with the exception of those over 60, the most in those aged under 20 (-12%) and those aged 20–24 (-8%).

Unemployment increased at all levels of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment increased from September last year at all levels of education; the increase was greatest among those with post-secondary non-tertiary education (95%), lower-degree level tertiary education (60%), level of education 'unknown' (55%) and higher-degree level tertiary education (44%).

Unemployment increased in all occupational groups

Examined by occupation, unemployment increased in all groups from September last year; the most in the category 'unknown' (23,700), service and sales workers (17,700) and craft and related trades workers (12,500). Unemployment increased the least among soldiers (20), skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers (500) and managers (1,300).



Increase in long-term unemployment


At the end of September, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 81,100, up 18,500 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 48,100 were men and 32,900 were women. The number of men increased by 10,900 (29%) from the previous year and the number of women by 7,600 (30%). The number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than two years totalled 33,500, an increase of 3,800 from the previous year.

Decrease in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of September, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 113,900, down 6,400 on the previous year. Compared with August, the number of persons covered by such services increased by 7,900. The activation rate at the end of September was 26.5%, which is 8.2 percentage points lower than a year earlier. In all, 4.1% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 54,600, down 3,400 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 59,300, down 3,000 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 429,700 at the end of September. This is 83,300 more than a year earlier. The increase in broad unemployment was mainly due to an increase in the number of unemployed jobseekers.


The number of placements fell in local government and the private sector

At the end of September, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the State or receiving start-up grants totalled 22,900, which is 1,500 less than the year before. Of those employed, 2% were in government jobs, 25% in local government jobs and 73% in the private sector. Since September last year, the number of placements in local government jobs has decreased by 19% and placements in the private sector by 1% but increased by 1% in government jobs. Of those employed, 52% were men. Placements for men decreased by 800, and those for women by 700 from the previous year.

in target profession at the end of the month




Increase in the number of persons in labour market training

At the end of September, labour market training was attended by 21,600 students, up 1,700 on the previous year. Of the students, 10,300 were men and 11,300 were women. The number of men increased by 600, and the number of women by 1,100 compared to September in the previous year. During September, 6,000 new students began labour market training, representing a decrease of 900 on the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' in September were people in integration training (7,100), which is 500 more than the year before.

at the end of the month and during the previous year




The number of persons in training increased

At the end of September, 4,800 persons were in training, which is 2,400 more than the year before. Of those in training, 2,500 were men and 2,400 women. Career coaching had 4,000 participants, which is 2,400 more than a year earlier. The number of participants in job search training was 800 which is as many as a year ago.

The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year


Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 34,800 people, representing a decrease of 2,600 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 14,200, down 1,300 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 20,700, representing a decrease of 1,200 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 10,500 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 100 on the previous year.

at the end of the month and during the previous year by sector




The number of job alternation substitutes decreased

A total of 3,300 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of September, which is 300 less than a year earlier. Of the substitutes, 1,200 were men and 2,100 were women. The number of men decreased by 100, and the number of women by 200 from the previous year.

Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 20,300 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of September, which is 3,800 less than a year earlier. Of the participants, 11,600 were men and 8,800 were women. The number of men decreased by 2,000 and the number of women by 1,800 from the previous year.

Participation in work and training trials decreased

Work and training trials had a total of 6,100 participants at the end of September, which is 2,300 less than the year before. Of the participants, 3,000 were men and 3,200 were women. The number of men decreased by 1,000 and the number of women by 1,300 from the previous year.

Decrease in the number of new vacancies

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices during September totalled 58,100, which is 7,400 less than in September last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies at Employment and Economic Development Offices in September amounted to 103,000, which is 18,500 less than a year ago. A total of 8,700 of these vacancies were filled during September, 3,700 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 43,800 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number applicants. In addition, a total of 2,800 vacancies were cancelled and 1,400 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at the end of September was 47,900, down 10,800 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had decreased for eight occupational groups. The number of new vacancies had decreased the most in the groups of service and sales personnel (-2,200), construction, repair and manufacturing workers (-1,800) office and customer service workers (-1,200) and process and transport workers (-1,100). The number of new vacancies had increased in the group of technicians and associate professionals (60) and in the category 'unknown' (30).

The data is collected from the customer service registry (URA) used by the TE offices. This means that the data used by MEAE Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based. The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the aforementioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
