



# In January, 332,800 unemployed jobseekers






A total of 332,800 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices at the end of January. This is 81,200 more than a year earlier. The number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 24,500 from the previous month. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 12.7% of the labour force, which is 3.1 percentage points more than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

### Trends:

- Total number of jobseekers increased by 136,000
- The number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 81,000 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off increased by 39,000
- Services included in the activation rate had 4,000 less people than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies decreased by 9,000 from last year




# The total number of jobseekers increased

At the end of January, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices totalled 667,500, up 135,800 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 344,200 were men and 323,300 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men increased by 73,700 and the number of women by 62,100.

Of the jobseekers, 203,700 were employed, 185,000 of them were on the open labour market and 18,700 were employed through the services of the employment and economic development administration. The number of jobseekers on the open labour market increased by 46,600 from January a year earlier. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 113,700, of whom 26,700 were in services promoting employment and 65,300 in training. Of the jobseekers, 332,800 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 81,200 more than the year before. In January, 57,800 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 20,000 less than in December. The number of people fully laid off increased by 39,400 from January a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 17,300, representing an increase of 11,300 from the year before.

### Increase in unemployed jobseekers in January

At the end of January, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices totalled 332,800, up 81,200 on the previous year. Compared with December, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 24,500. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 17,500 in January, down 2,300 from January a year ago. In January, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 54,200, representing an increase of 1,900 on the year before. The number of starting periods of unemployment decreased by 26,000 from December. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered from the existing groups of jobseekers.


The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 35,500, up 10,100 from January a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 11,900 at the end of January, up 4,400 from the year before.

In January, 57,800 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 20,000 less than in December. The number of people fully laid off increased by 39,400 from January a year earlier. In January, the number of job searches among the fully laid off people totalled 5,100, representing an increase of 1,900 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 16,500, up 8,300 from January a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs decreased by 22,300 from December. The number of people fully laid off increased in all occupational groups; the greatest increases were in the groups of service and sales workers (11,800), 'unknown' (6,500), craft and related trades workers (5,700), and technicians and associate professionals (3,600).

by Centre for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY)




# Unemployment increased in the areas of all ELY Centres

Compared to the same period in the previous year, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased in January in the areas of all Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres); the most in Uusimaa (56%), Southwest Finland (32%), Lapland (32%) and Ostrobothnia (29%). The number of unemployed jobseekers increased the least in Kainuu (7%), South Savo (12%), North Karelia (13%) and Southeast Finland (13%). In the Åland Islands, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 156 per cent. Compared to December, the number of unemployed jobseekers also decreased in the areas of all ELY Centres; the most in Ostrobothnia (-16%), Southwest Finland (-13%) and South Ostrobothnia (-12%).

### Unemployed jobseekers and jobs vacant in Employment and Economic Development Office by ELY centre



# Increase in unemployment higher among women than men


Of the unemployed jobseekers, 193,100 (58%) were men and 139,700 (42%) were women, indicating an increase of 14,500 for men and 10,000 for women from the figures for December. Compared with January a year ago, unemployment increased by 45,000 (30%) among men and by 36,100 (35%) among women.



# Unemployment increased in all age groups

At the end of January, unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age numbered 40,200, representing an increase of 9,500 from January a year ago. Youth unemployment fell by 3,500 from December. For those under 20, the number of unemployed was 7,400. Among those over 50, the number of unemployed was 120,900, representing an increase of 26,500 on the year before. Among those over 55, the number of unemployed was 84,900, representing an increase of 19,000 on the year before. Proportionally, unemployment increased the most in the age group 25–49 (on average 36%) and those over 64 (100%). Compared to December, unemployment decreased in all age groups with the exception of those over 64, the most in those aged under 20 (-22%) and those aged 40–49 (-9%).


# Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group



# Unemployment increased at all levels of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment increased from January last year at all levels of education; the increase was greatest among those with post-secondary non-tertiary education (77%), level of education 'unknown' (54%), lower-degree level tertiary education (42%) and upper secondary education (35%).

# Unemployment increased in all occupational groups

Examined by occupation, unemployment increased in all groups from January last year; the most in the groups of service and sales workers (20,700), category 'unknown' (16,000) and craft and related trades workers (11,200). Unemployment increased the least in the groups of armed forces (60), skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers (600), and managers (1,200).


### Increase in long-term unemployment

At the end of January, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 93,400, up 30,000 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 56,100 were men and 37,400 were women. The number of men increased by 18,000 (47%) from the previous year and the number of women by 12,000 (47%). The number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than two years totalled 37,700, an increase of 9,100 from the previous year.



# Decrease in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of January, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 112,300, down 3,600 on the previous year. Compared with December, the number of persons covered by such services increased by 4,600. The activation rate at the end of January was 25.2%, which is 6.3 percentage points lower than a year earlier. In all, 4.1% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 53,300, down 2,100 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 59,000, down 1,500 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 445,100 at the end of January. This is 77,500 more than a year earlier. The increase in broad unemployment was mainly due to an increase in the number of unemployed jobseekers.


# The number of placements increased in the private sector

At the end of January, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the State or receiving start-up grants totalled 22,700, which is 300 more than the year before. Of those employed, 1% were in government jobs, 25% in local government jobs and 74% in the private sector. Since January last year, the number of placements has decreased by 15% in local government jobs and by 2% in government jobs and increased by 9% in the private sector. Of those employed, 50% were men. From the previous year, placements for men increased by 200, and those for women by 100.

in target profession at the end of the month




# Increase in the number of persons in labour market training

At the end of January, labour market training was attended by 21,700 students, up 2,100 on the previous year. Of the students, 10,300 were men and 11,500 were women. The number of men increased by 500, and the number of women by 1,600 from January last year. During January, 5,300 new students began labour market training, representing an increase of 500 on the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' were people in integration training (7,100), which is 600 more than the year before.

at the end of the month and during the previous year




# The number of persons in training increased

At the end of January, 3,600 persons were in training, which is 800 more than the year before. Of those in training, 1,900 were men and 1,700 women. Career coaching was provided to 2,900 participants, which is 800 more than a year earlier. The number of participants in job search training was 700 which is as many as a year ago.

# The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year


Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 34,400 people, representing a decrease of 2,700 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 13,900, down 1,500 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 20,500, representing a decrease of 1,200 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 10,100 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 800 on the previous year.

at the end of the month and during the previous year by sector




### The number of job alternation substitutes decreased

A total of 3,100 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of January, which is 100 less than a year earlier. Of the substitutes, 1,100 were men and 2,100 were women. The number of both men and women decreased by almost 100 from the previous year.

### REHABILITATIVE WORK ACTIVITIES






### Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 20,700 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of January, which is 2,200 less than a year earlier. Of the participants, 11,700 were men and 9,000 were women. The number of men decreased by 1,100 and the number of women by 1,000 from the previous year.

### Participation in work and training trials decreased

Work and training trials had a total of 6,000 participants at the end of January, which is 1,900 fewer than the year before. Of the participants, 2,900 were men and 3,000 were women. The number of men decreased by 700 and the number of women by 1,300 from the previous year.

# Decrease in the number of new vacancies

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices during January totalled 83,600, which is 9,200 less than in January last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies at Employment and Economic Development Offices in January amounted to 129,900, which is 16,400 less than a year ago. A total of 7,400 of these vacancies were filled during January, 2,300 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 37,200 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number applicants. In addition, a total of 2,500 vacancies were cancelled and 1,300 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at the end of January was 85,200, down 6,500 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had decreased in five occupational groups. The number of new vacancies had decreased the most in the groups of elementary occupations (-6,000), clerical support workers (-3,200), craft and related trades workers (-2,300), and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (-1,100). The number of new vacancies had increased the most in the groups of technicians and associate professionals (2,700) and service and sales workers (1,400).

### Information about the website

On this website you will find the latest statistics from the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment's monthly Employment Bulletin. You can access a .pdf version of the current and previous months' Employment Bulletin by following the link on the right. The Employment Bulletin is based on the data from the MEAE's Employment Service Statistics. The Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment compiles statistics on the clients of the Employment and economic development offices (TE offices), including registered job-seekers, labour market policy services, and job vacancies reported to TE offices by employers. The data is collected from the customer service registry (URA) used by the TE offices. This means that the data used by MEAE Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based. The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the aforementioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
