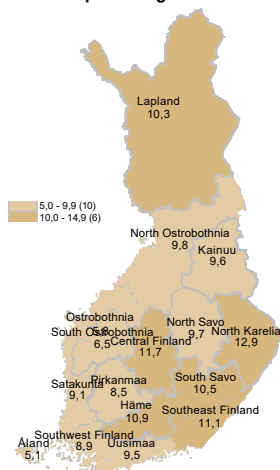

250,700 unemployed jobseekers in March

Unemployed jobseekers' percentage of the workforce by ELY centre



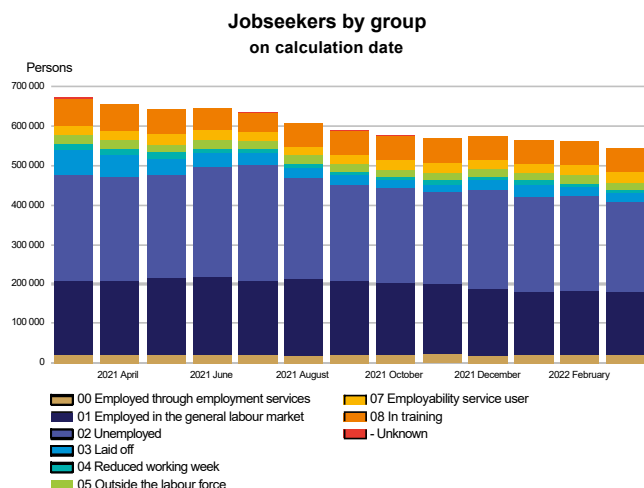
At the end of March, a total of 250,700 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. This is 80,800 fewer than a year earlier, and 14,900 fewer than the previous month. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 9.5% of the labour force, which is 3.1 percentage points less than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

Trends:

- Total number of all jobseekers decreased by 128,200
- The number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 80,800 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off decreased by 41,800
- Services included in the activation rate had 2,900 less people than a year ago
- 48,500 more new job vacancies compared to the previous year

The total number of jobseekers decreased

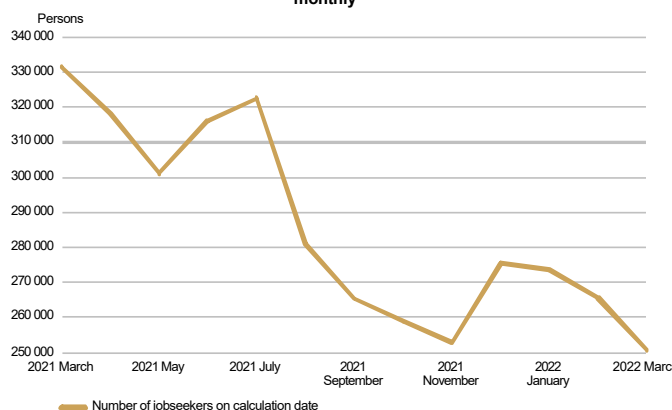
At the end of March, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 542,600, down 128,200 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 276,900 were men and 265,800 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 67,200 and the number of women by 61,000. Of the jobseekers, 234,800, or 2,800 more than a year earlier, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment.

Of the jobseekers, 180,500 were employed, 159,500 of them were on the open labour market and 21,000 were employed through the services organised by the employment and economic development administration and local government pilots on employment. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 103,800, of whom 26,100 were in services promoting employment and 59,300 in training. Of the jobseekers, 250,700 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 80,800 less than the year before. In March, 21,000 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 5,900 less than in February. The number of people fully laid off decreased by 41,800 from March a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 7,600, representing a decrease of 9,100 from the year before.

monthly

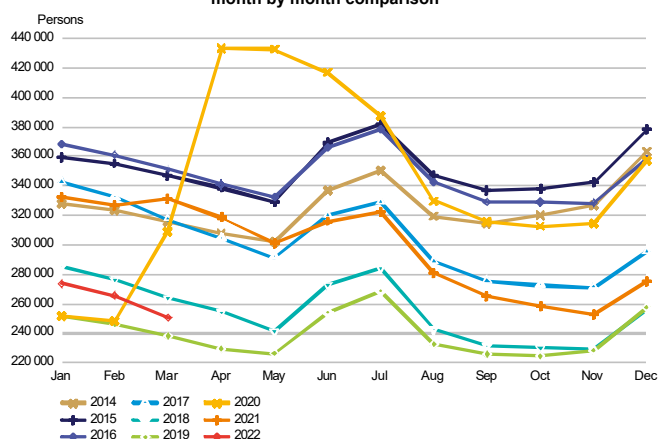


Decrease in unemployed jobseekers in March

At the end of March, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 250,700, down 80,800 on the previous year. Compared with February, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 14,900. Of the unemployed jobseekers, 135,000, or 27,100 fewer than in March a year ago, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 10,400, down 6,600 from March a year ago. In March, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 30,000, representing a decrease of 25,800 on the year before. The number of starting periods of unemployment decreased by 600 from February. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered from the existing groups of jobseekers.

The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 28,600, down 7,000 from March a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 8,800 at the end of March, down 3,200 from the year before.

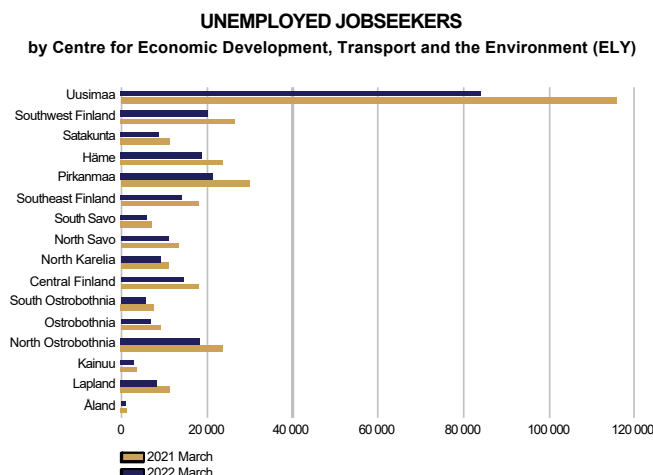
UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

In March, 21,000 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 5,900 fewer than in February. The number of people fully laid off decreased by 41,800 from March a year earlier. In March, the number of job searches among the fully laid off people totalled 1,800, representing a decrease of 5,900 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 4,900, down 23,800 from March a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs decreased by 2,900 from February. The number of people fully laid off decreased in all occupational groups. The greatest decreases were in the groups of service and sales workers (-15,000), craft and related trades workers (-6,000), 'unknown' (-6,000), technicians and associate professionals (-3,600), and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (-3,500).

Unemployment decreased in the areas of all ELY Centres

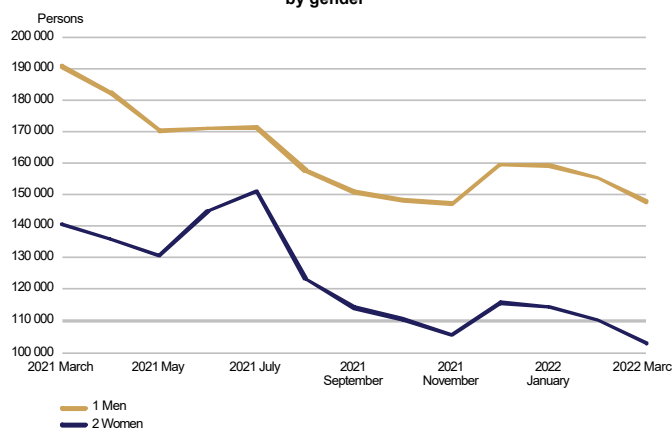
Compared to the same period in the previous year, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in March in the areas of all Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres); the most in Pirkanmaa (-28%), Ostrobothnia (-28%), Uusimaa (-28%) and Lapland (-27%). The number of unemployed jobseekers decreased the least in Kainuu (-16%), North Karelia (-16%), South Savo (-18%), Central Finland (-18%) and North Savo (-19%). The number of unemployed jobseekers fell the most in Åland, by 46%. Also compared to February, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in the areas of all ELY Centres; the most in Ostrobothnia (-9%) and Pirkanmaa (-7%). Unemployment decreased the least from the previous month in Kainuu (-3%), North Karelia (-3%) and South Savo (-3%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers fell by 9% from February.

Unemployed jobseekers by gender and age-group

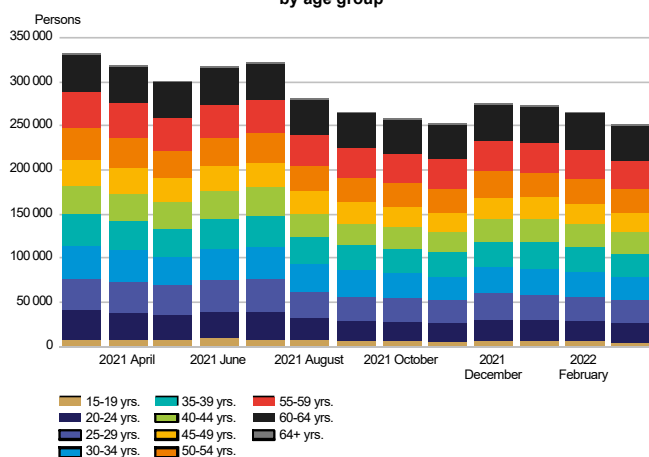
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment decreased more among women than men

Of the unemployed jobseekers, 147,900 (59%) were men and 102,800 (41%) were women, indicating a decrease of 7,500 for men and 7,400 for women from the figures for February. Compared with March a year ago, unemployment decreased by 43,000 (-23%) among men and by 37,800 (-27%) among women.

by age group**



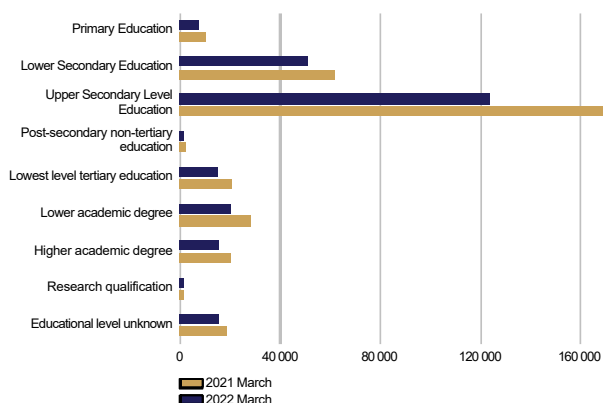
Unemployment decreased in all age groups

At the end of March, unemployed jobseekers aged under 25 numbered 26,300, representing a decrease of 14,300 from March a year ago. Youth unemployment fell by 1,900 from February. There were 4,700 unemployed persons under 20. Among those over 50, the number of unemployed was 98,800, representing a decrease of 21,200 on the year before. Among those over 55, the number of unemployed was 73,200, representing a decrease of 11,400 on the year before. Unemployment decreased the most among those under 30 (-33%) and the least among those over 59 (-6%). With the exception of those over 64, unemployment decreased in all age groups compared with February, the most among those aged 20-29 (-7%).



Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group

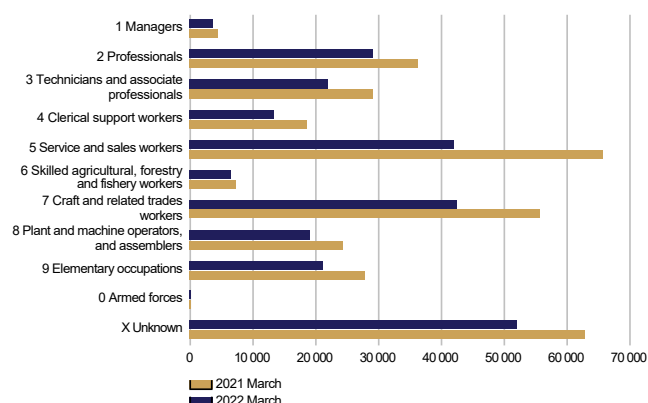
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment decreased at all levels of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment decreased from March last year at all levels of education; the decrease was greatest among those with post-secondary non-tertiary education (-37%), lower-degree level tertiary education (-29%) and upper secondary education (-27%). Unemployment fell the least among those with doctorate or equivalent level tertiary education (-16%), higher level basic qualifications (-17%), and level of education 'unknown' (-18%).

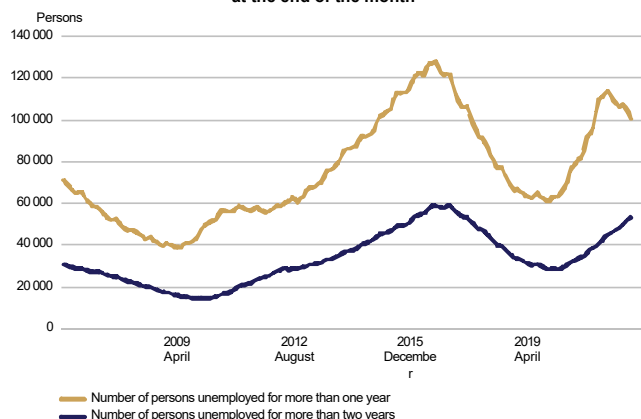
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment decreased in all occupational groups

Examined by occupation, unemployment decreased in all groups from March last year; the most in the groups of service and sales workers (-23,600), craft and related trades workers (-13,200), 'unknown' (-11,000), technicians and associate professionals (-7,100) and professionals (-7,100). Unemployment decreased the least in the occupational groups of armed forces (-50), managers (-900) and skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers (-900).

at the end of the month**

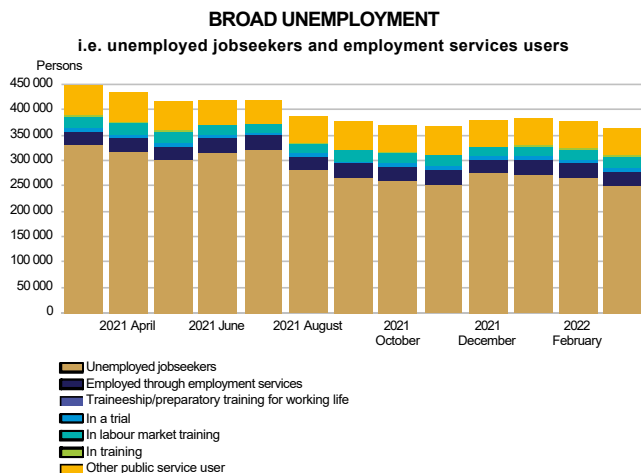


Increase in long-term unemployment

At the end of March, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 100,500, down 3,500 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 60,400 were men and 40,000 were women. The number of men decreased by 2,100 (-3%) from the previous year and the number of women by 1,400 (-3%). Of those unemployed in the long term, 53,300 had been unemployed without interruption for more than two years. This is 13,600 more than a year ago.



Services

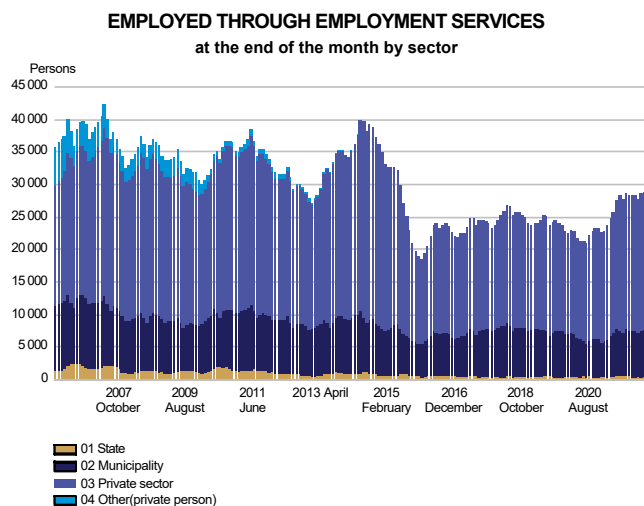


Decrease in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of March, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 114,200, down 2,900 on the previous year. Compared with February, the number of persons covered by such services increased by 2,800. Of those covered by services, 63,100 were customers of the local government pilots, which is 900 more than in March last year. The activation rate at the end of March was 31.3%, which is 5.2 percentage points higher than a year earlier. In all, 4.1% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 54,400, down 1,200 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 59,800, down 1,600 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 364,900 at the end of March. This is 83,700 less than a year earlier. The decrease in broad unemployment was mainly due to a decrease in the number of unemployed.



The number of placements increased in all sectors

At the end of March, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the State or receiving start-up grants totalled 29,500, which is 4,800 more than the year before. Of those in placements, 1% were in central government jobs, 26% in local government jobs and 73% in the private sector. Since March last year, the number of placements has increased by 21% in local government jobs, by 20% in the private sector and by 1% in central government jobs. Of those in placements, 52% were men. Placements for men increased by 2,600, and those for women by 2,200 from the previous year.

in target profession at the end of the month

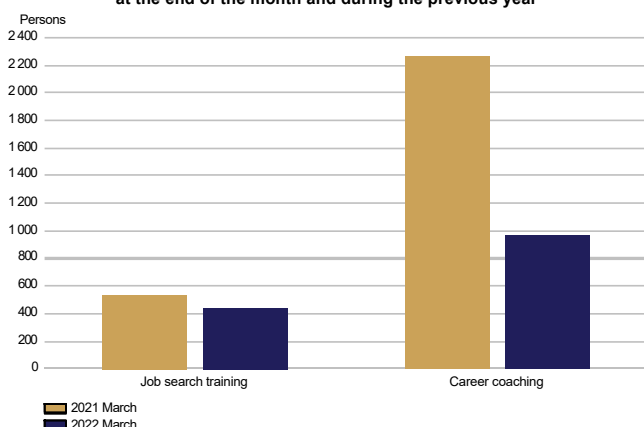


Number of persons in labour market training decreased

At the end of March, labour market training was attended by 21,900 students, down 2,400 on the previous year. Of the students, 10,800 were men and 11,100 were women. The number of men decreased by 700, and the number of women by 1,700 from March last year. During March, 5,000 new students began labour market training, representing a decrease of 600 on the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' were people in integration training (6,300), which is 1,200 less than the year before.

The number of persons in training decreased

At the end of March, 1,400 persons were in training, which is 1,400 less than the year before. Of those in training, 700 were men and 700 women. Career coaching was provided to 1,000 participants, which is 1,300 less than a year earlier. The number of participants in job search training decreased by 100 from the year before.

in person's profession at the end of the month



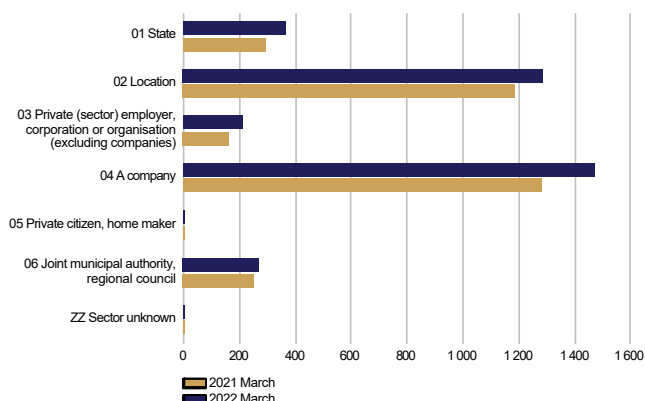
The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year

Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 31,200 people, representing a decrease of 3,200 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 12,000, down 1,900 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 19,200, representing a decrease of 1,300 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 9,300 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 700 on the previous year.



Job alternation, rehabilitative work and trials

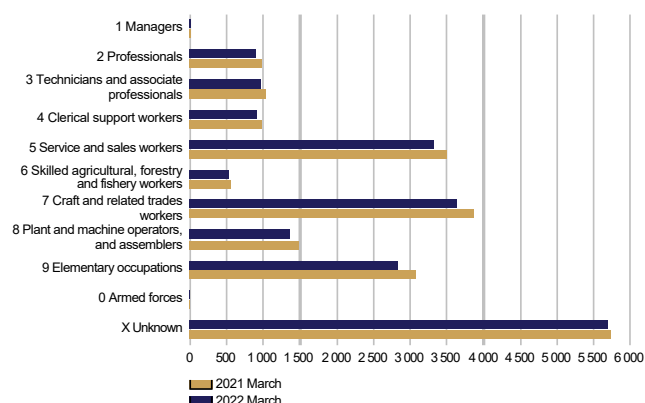
AS A JOB ALTERNATION SUBSTITUTE

The number of job alternation substitutes increased

A total of 3,600 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of March, which is 400 more than a year earlier. Of the substitutes, 1,300 were men and 2,300 were women. The number of men increased by 200 and the number of women by 300 from the previous year.

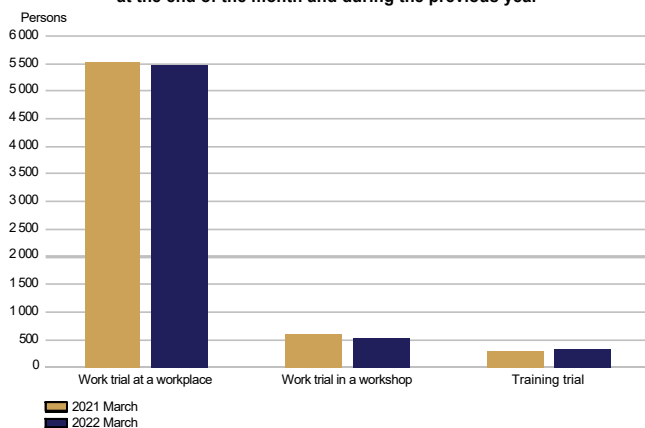
REHABILITATIVE WORK ACTIVITIES

Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 20,200 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of March, which is 1,000 less than a year earlier. Of the participants, 11,300 were men and 8,900 were women. The number of men decreased by 700 and the number of women by 400 from the previous year.

at the end of the month and during the previous year



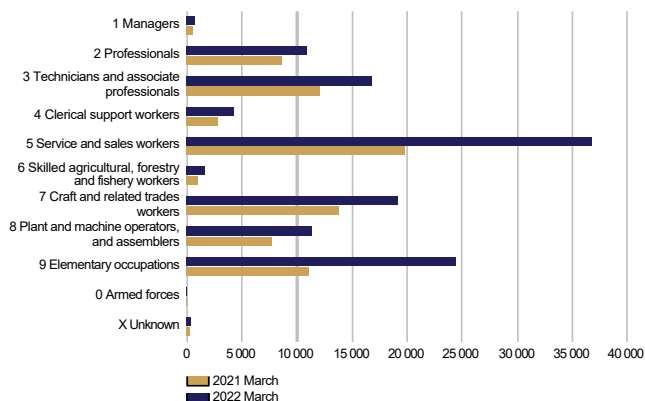
Participation in work and training trials decreased

Work and training trials had a total of 6,300 participants at the end of March, which is 100 less than the year before. Of the participants, 3,100 were men and 3,300 were women. The number of men fell by 100 and the number of women remained unchanged from the previous year.



Jobs vacant

NEW JOB VACANCIES

Increase in the number of new vacancies from the year before

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment during March totalled 126,200, which is 48,500 more than in March last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies in March amounted to 259,100, which is 96,600 more than a year ago. A total of 16,800 of these vacancies were filled during March, 3,800 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 103,500 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number of applicants. In addition, a total of 7,500 vacancies were cancelled and 2,400 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at Employment and Economic Development Offices and in local government pilots at the end of March was 132,700, up 53,400 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had increased for all occupational groups; the greatest increases were in the groups of service and sales workers (17,000), elementary occupations (13,400), craft and related trades workers (5,400), associate professionals and technicians (4,700), and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (3,500).

Information about the website

On this website you will find the latest statistics from the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment's monthly Employment Bulletin. You can access a .pdf version of the current and previous months' Employment Bulletin by following the link on the right. The Employment Bulletin is based on the data from the MEAE's Employment Service Statistics. The Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment compiles statistics on the clients of the Employment and economic development offices (TE offices), including registered job-seekers, labour market policy services, and job vacancies reported to TE offices by employers. The data is collected from the customer service registry (URA) used by the TE offices. This means that the data used by MEAE Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based. The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the aforementioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
