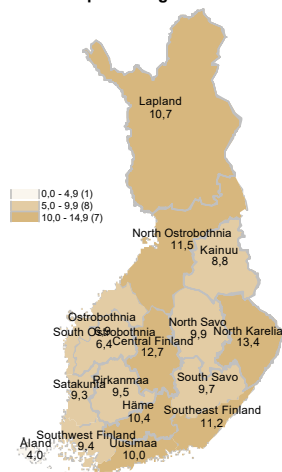

In June, 264,700 unemployed jobseekers

Unemployed jobseekers' percentage of the workforce by ELY centre



At the end of June, a total of 264,700 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. This represents an increase of 4,900 from the previous year. Compared with the previous month, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 25,800. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 10.0% of the labour force, which is 0.1 percentage points more than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

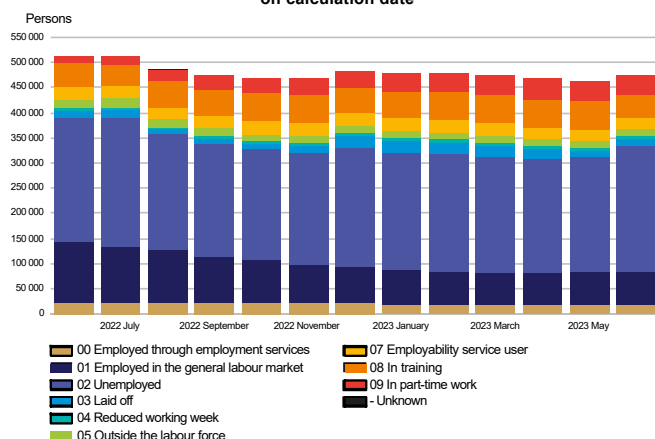
Trends:

- Total number of all jobseekers decreased by 37,300
- The number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 4,900 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off increased by 3,400
- Services included in the activation rate had 1,500 more people than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies decreased by 32,800 from the previous year

The total number of jobseekers decreased

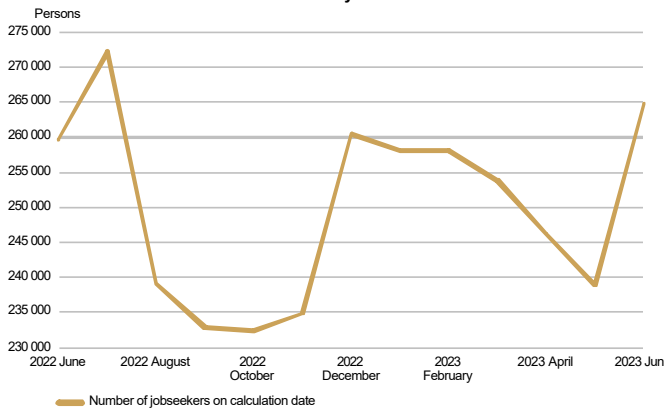
At the end of June, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 475,900, down 37,300 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 240,800 were men and 235,100 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 13,300 and the number of women by 24,000. Of the jobseekers, 246,600, or 9,500 more than a year earlier, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment.

Of the jobseekers, 124,000 were employed: 64,300 of them were in full-time work, 39,700 were in part-time work and 20,000 were employed through the services organised by the employment and economic development administration and local government pilots on employment. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 82,100, of whom 23,400 were in services promoting employment and 45,300 in training. Of the jobseekers, 264,700 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 4,900 more than the year before. In June, 15,800 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 1,200 more than in May. The number of people fully laid off increased by 3,400 from June a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 5,000, representing a decrease of 700 from the year before.

monthly

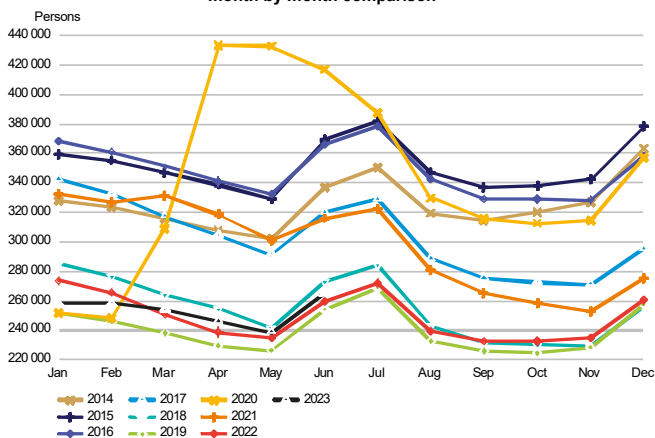


Increase in unemployed jobseekers in June

At the end of June, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 264,700, up 4,900 on the previous year. Compared with May, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 25,800. Of the unemployed jobseekers, 151,200, or 8,600 more than in June a year ago, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 20,100, up 1,900 from June a year ago. In June, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 58,200, representing an increase of 4,800 on the year before. The number of starting periods of unemployment increased by 23,200 from May. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered from the existing groups of jobseekers.

The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 39,600, up 6,100 from June a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 9,300 at the end of June, up 700 from the year before.

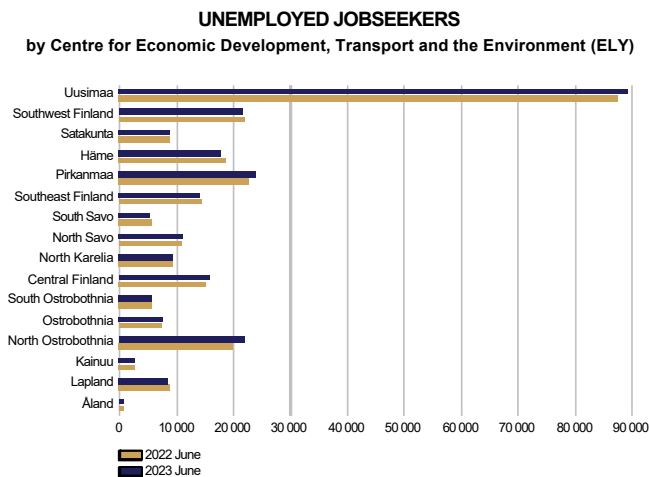
UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

In June, 15,800 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 1,200 more than in May. The number of people fully laid off increased by 3,400 from June a year earlier. In June, the number of job searches among the fully laid off people totalled 2,000, representing an increase of 700 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 8,400, up 3,700 from June a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs increased by 1,700 from May. Examined by occupation, the number of people fully laid off increased in seven groups and decreased in three groups. The number of people fully laid off increased the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (1,700), "unknown" (900), plant and machine operators, and assemblers (800) and professionals (700). The number of people fully laid off decreased the most among service and sales workers (-900). The number of laid-off people remained unchanged in the group of armed forces.

Unemployment decreased in the areas of seven ELY Centres

Compared to the same period in the previous year, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in June in the areas of seven Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres); the most in Häme (-4%), Kainuu (-3%), Lapland (-3%), South Savo (-2%), Southeast Finland (-2%) and South Ostrobothnia (-2%). The number of unemployed jobseekers grew the most in North Ostrobothnia (11%), Pirkanmaa (6%), Central Finland (4%) and Ostrobothnia (4%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased (1%). Compared to May, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased in the areas of all ELY Centres; the most in Ostrobothnia (23%), Pirkanmaa (15%), Central Finland (13%), South Ostrobothnia (13%), North Ostrobothnia (13%) and Southwest Finland (13%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers did not change.

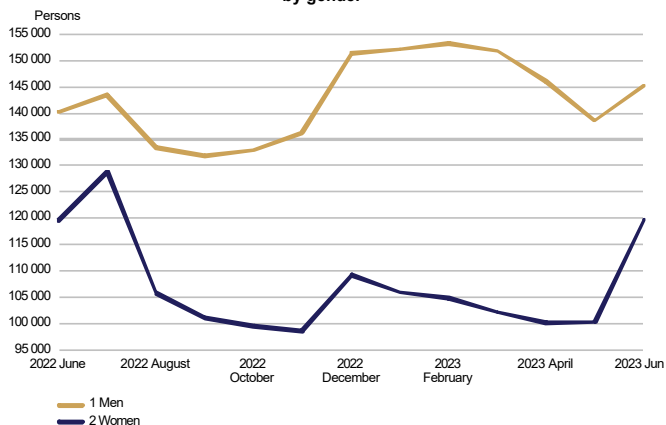

Unemployed jobseekers by gender and age-group

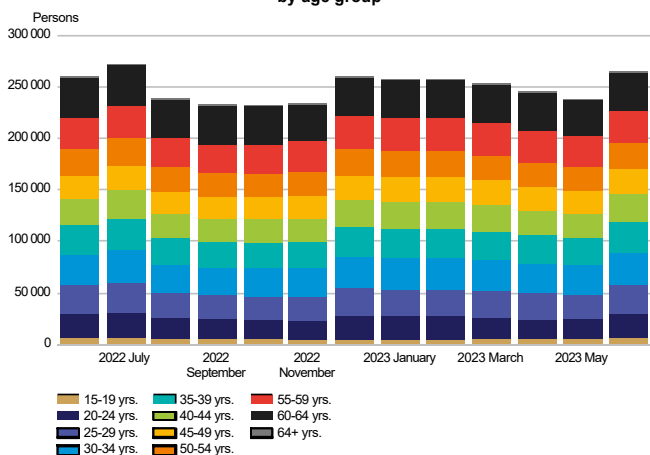
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment increased among men and remained the same among women

Of the unemployed jobseekers, 145,100 (55%) were men and 119,600 (45%) were women, indicating an increase of 6,400 for men and 19,400 for women from the figures for May. Compared with June a year ago, unemployment increased by 4,900 (3%) among men and remained the same among women.

by age group**



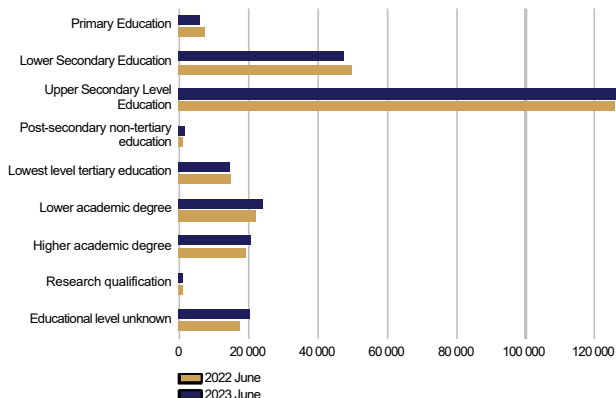
Unemployment decreased among those 50 years of age or more and those between 20 and 29 years of age

At the end of June, unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age numbered 29,900, representing an increase of 100 from June a year ago. Youth unemployment increased from May by 5,600. For those under 20, the number of unemployed was 7,100. Among those over 50, the number of unemployed was 93,300, representing a decrease of 1,900 on the year before. Among those over 55, the number of unemployed was 68,800, representing a decrease of 1,300 on the year before. Unemployment decreased the most among those over 64 (-8%), those between 60 and 64 years of age (-3%), and those between 50 and 54 (-2%). Unemployment increased the most among those between 40 and 44 (7%) and those between 30 and 34 years of age (7%). Compared with May, unemployment increased in all age groups. Unemployment increased the most among those between 15 and 19 (55%) and those between 20 and 24 years of age (16%).



Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group

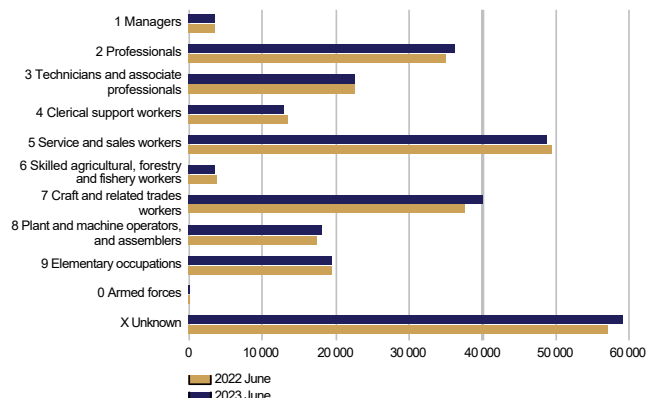
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment decreased at only three levels of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment decreased from June last year at three levels of education. Unemployment decreased among those with lower level basic qualifications (-16%), higher level basic qualifications (-4%) and lowest level of tertiary education (-4%). Unemployment increased the most among those with education level unknown (16%), lower-degree level tertiary education (10%), post-secondary non-tertiary education (10%) and higher-degree level tertiary education (6%).

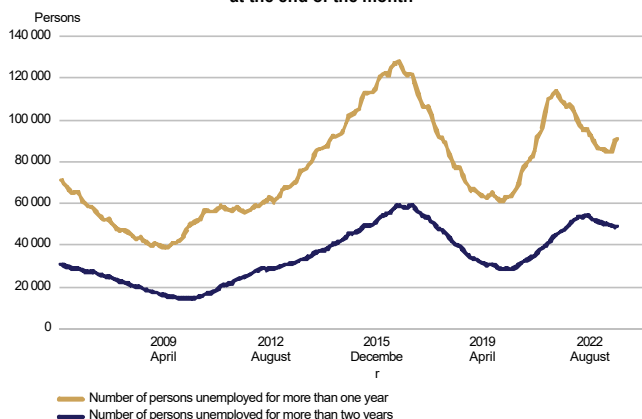
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment decreased in four occupational groups

Examined by occupation, the unemployment fell in four groups from June of last year; the most among service and sales workers (-800), office and customer service workers (-600) and skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers (-200). Unemployment increased the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (2,400), "unknown" (2,200), specialists (1,100), plant and machine operators, and assemblers (600).

at the end of the month**

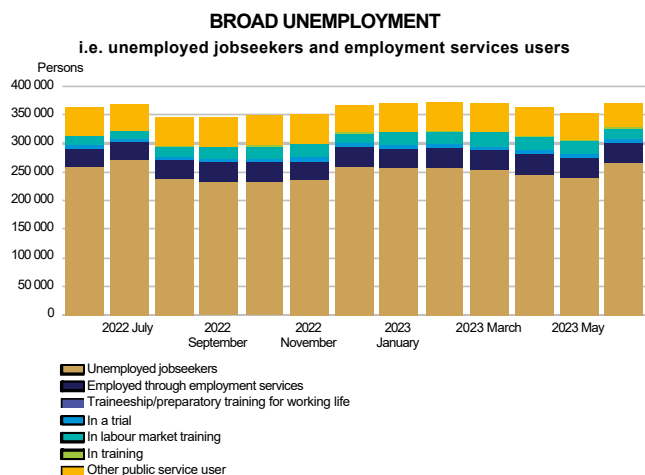


Decrease in long-term unemployment

At the end of June, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 91,000, down 4,500 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 54,200 were men and 36,800 were women. The number of men decreased by 3,000 (-5%) from the previous year and the number of women by 1,600 (-4%). Long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than two years numbered 49,000, which is 5,000 less than a year ago.



Services

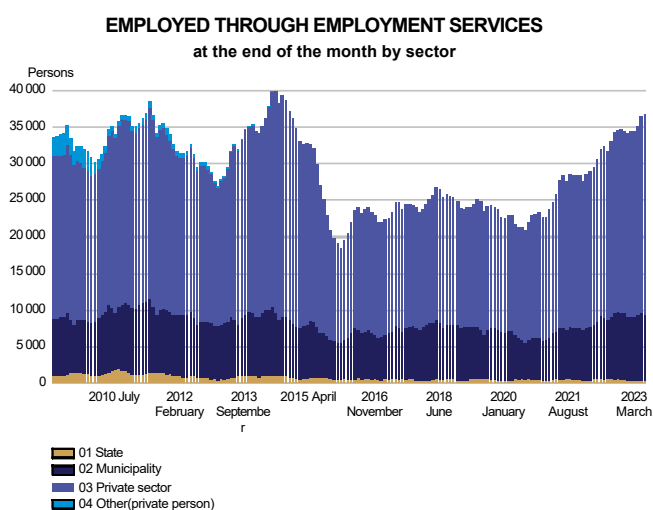


Increase in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of June, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 105,000, up 1,500 on the previous year. Compared with May, the number of persons covered by such services decreased by 9,500. Of those covered by services, 61,400 were customers of the local government pilots, which is 3,900 more than in June last year. The activation rate at the end of June was 28.4%, which is 0.1 percentage points lower than a year earlier. In all, 3.6% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 51,800, up 700 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 53,200, up 800 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 369,700 at the end of June. This is 6,400 more than a year earlier. The increase in broad unemployment was due to an increase in the number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services.



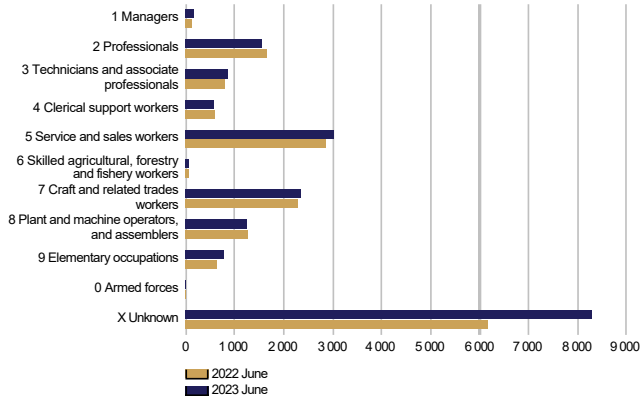
The number of placements increased in the municipal and private sectors

At the end of June, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the State or receiving start-up grants totalled 36,800, which is 4,300 more than the year before. Of those in placements, 1% were in central government, 25% in municipalities and 74% in the private sector. Since June last year, the number of placements had increased by 17% in the private sector and by 8% in municipalities, but decreased by 44% in central government. Of those in placements, 54% were men. Placements for men increased by 2,400, and those for women by 1,900 from the previous year.

in target profession at the end of the month

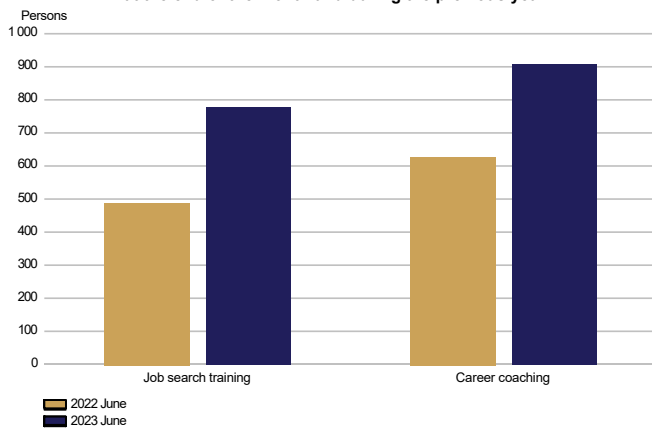


Increase in the number of persons in labour market training

At the end of June, labour market training was attended by 18,800 students, up 2,500 on the previous year. Of the students, 8,500 were men and 10,400 were women. The number of men increased by 600, and the number of women by 1,800 from June last year. During June, 1,400 new students began labour market training, representing a decrease of 100 on the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' were people in integration training (7,800), which is 2,100 more than the year before.

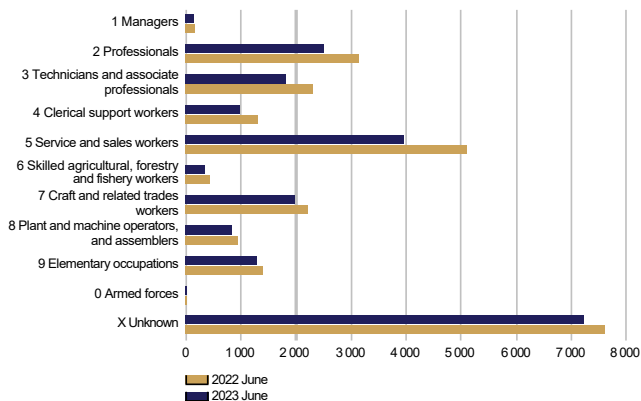
IN TRAINING

The number of persons in training increased

At the end of June, 1,700 persons were in training, which is 600 more than the year before. Of those in training, 800 were men and 800 were women. Career coaching had 900 participants in June, which is 300 more than a year earlier. The number of people receiving job search training was 800, which is 300 more than the previous year.

in person's profession at the end of the month



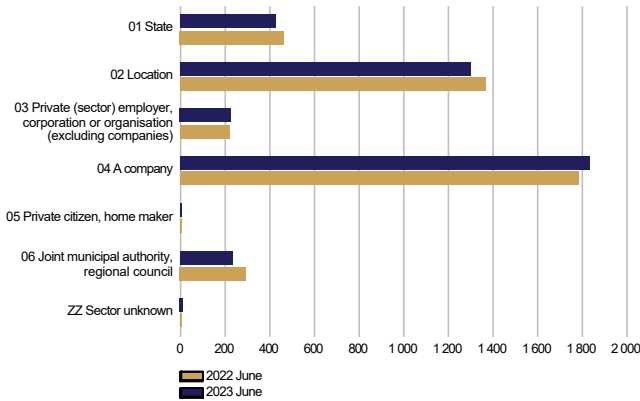
The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year

Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 21,100 people, representing a decrease of 3,600 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 8,100, down 1,400 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 12,900, representing a decrease of 2,200 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 6,600 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 200 on the previous year.



Job alternation, rehabilitative work and trials

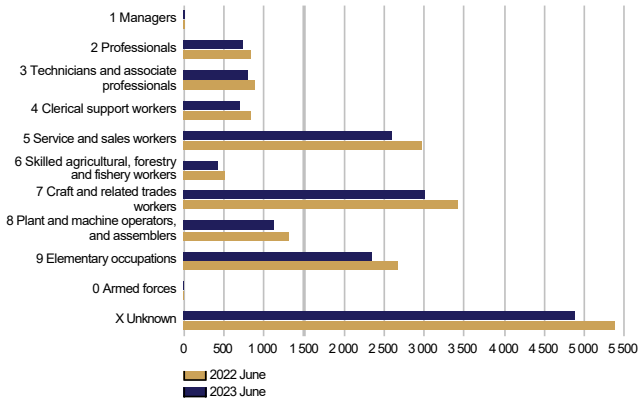
AS A JOB ALTERNATION SUBSTITUTE

The number of job alternation substitutes remained unchanged

A total of 4,100 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of June, which is the same number as the year earlier. Of the substitutes, 1,600 were men and 2,500 were women. Compared to the previous year, the number of both men and women remained unchanged.

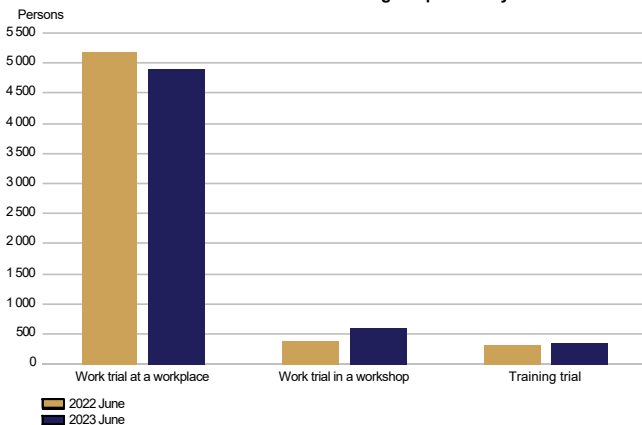
REHABILITATIVE WORK ACTIVITIES

Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 16,600 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of June, which is 2,200 less than a year earlier. Of the participants 9,600 were men and 7,100 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 1,300 and the number of women by 1,000.

at the end of the month and during the previous year



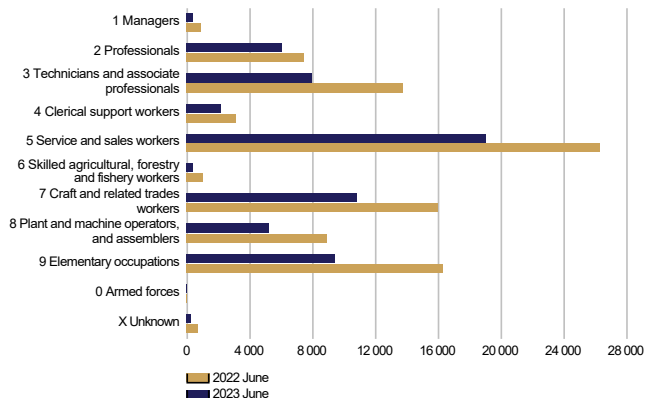
Participation in work and training trials remained unchanged

Work and training trials had a total of 5,900 participants at the end of June, which is the same as the year before. Of the participants 3,200 were men and 2,700 were women. Compared to the previous year, the number of both men and women remained unchanged.



Jobs vacant

Decrease in the number of new vacancies

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment during June totalled 61,500, which is 32,800 fewer than in June last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies in June was 123,900, which is 65,900 fewer than a year ago. A total of 11,700 of these vacancies were filled during June, 2,300 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 48,500 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number of applicants. In addition, a total of 11,700 vacancies were cancelled and 1,200 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at Employment and Economic Development Offices and in local government pilots at the end of June was 53,200, down 35,100 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had decreased in all occupational groups; the most in the groups of service and sales workers (-7,200), elementary occupations (-6,800), professionals (-5,800), craft and related trades workers (-5,200) and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (-3,700).
