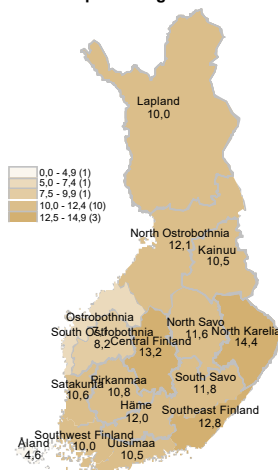

# In January, 291,100 unemployed jobseekers

Unemployed jobseekers' percentage of the workforce by ELY centre



At the end of January, a total of 291,100 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. This is 33,100 more than a year earlier. Compared with the previous month, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 6,500. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 10.9% of the labour force, which is 1.2 percentage points more than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

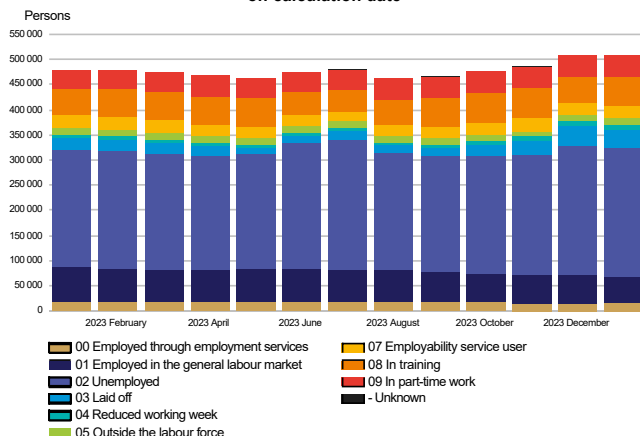
## Trends:

- Services included in the activation rate had 1,900 more people than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies decreased by 23,500 from the previous year

### The total number of jobseekers increased

At the end of January, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 508,500, up 28,100 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 276,300 were men and 232,200 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men increased by 26,400 and the number of women increased by 1,700. Of the jobseekers, 262,400, or 26,900 more than a year earlier, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment.

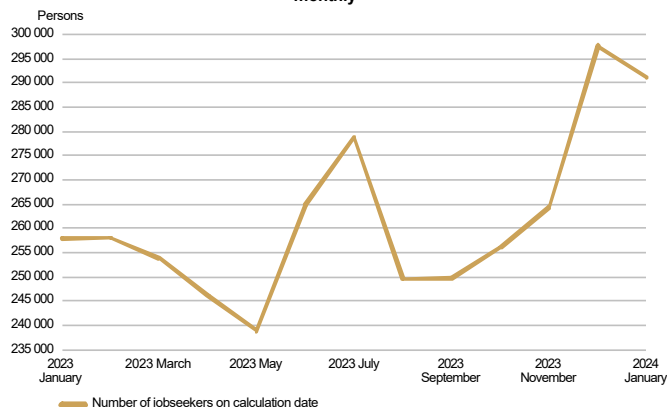
Of the jobseekers, 111,900 were employed: 52,800 of them were in full-time work, 43,300 were in part-time work and 15,800 were employed through the services organised by the employment and economic development administration and local government pilots on employment. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 95,200, of whom 24,300 were in services promoting employment and 58,400 in training. Of the jobseekers, 291,100 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 33,100 more than the year before. In January, 35,000 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 4,600 fewer than in December. The number of people fully laid off increased by 12,700 from January a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 10,300, representing an increase of 4,000 from the year before.

monthly

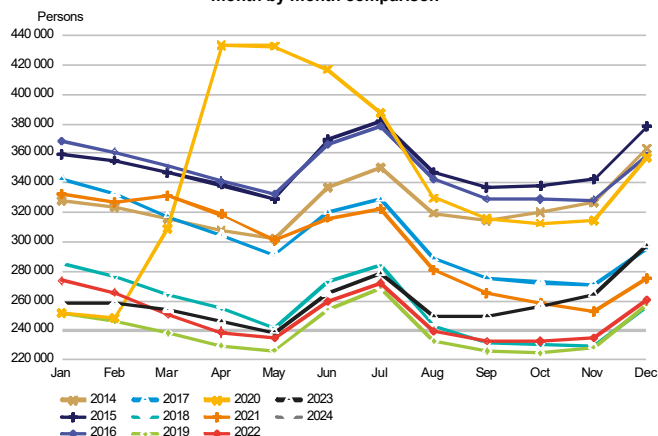


### Increase in unemployed jobseekers in January

At the end of January, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 291,100, up 33,100 on the previous year. Compared with December, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 6,500. Of the unemployed jobseekers, 160,400, or 20,000 more than in January a year ago, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 22,100 in January, up 2,400 from January a year ago. In January, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 51,800, representing an increase of 5,500 on the year before. The number of starting periods of unemployment decreased by 7,500 from December. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered from the existing groups of jobseekers.

The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 42,400, up 6,600 from January a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 11,200 at the end of January, up 1,700 from the year before.

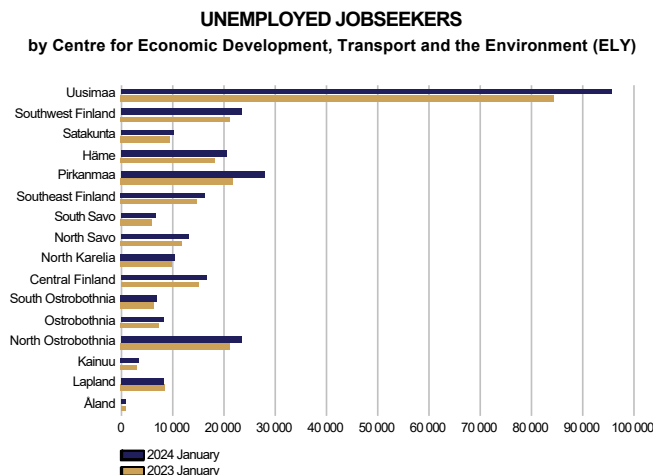
UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

In January, 35,000 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 4,600 fewer than in December. The number of people fully laid off increased by 12,700 from January a year earlier. In January, the number of job searches among the fully laid off people totalled 5,100, representing an increase of 1,100 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 15,900, up 4,500 from January a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs decreased by 6,400 from December. The number of people fully laid off increased in ten occupational groups. The number of people fully laid off increased the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (5,400), plant and machine operators, and assemblers (1,900), "unknown" (1,800), professionals (1,300) and associate professionals and technicians (1,100). The number of laid-off people remained unchanged in the group of armed forces.



## Unemployed jobseekers by region



### Unemployment increased in the areas of almost all ELY Centres

The number of unemployed jobseekers increased from January last year in all areas of Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres), with the exception of Lapland (-4%). The number of unemployed jobseekers grew the most in Pirkanmaa (28%), South Ostrobothnia (15%), Uusimaa (14%), South Savo (13%) and Ostrobothnia (13%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased 3%. Compared to December, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in the areas of all ELY Centres; the most in Central Finland (-6%), Ostrobothnia (-5%), Southeast Finland (-5%) and South Ostrobothnia (-5%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased 1% from December.

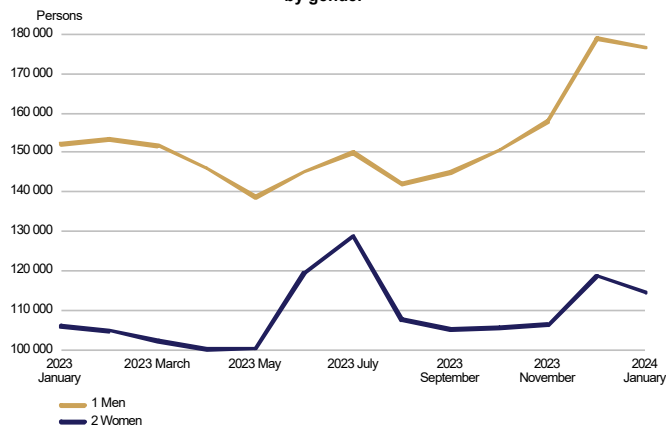

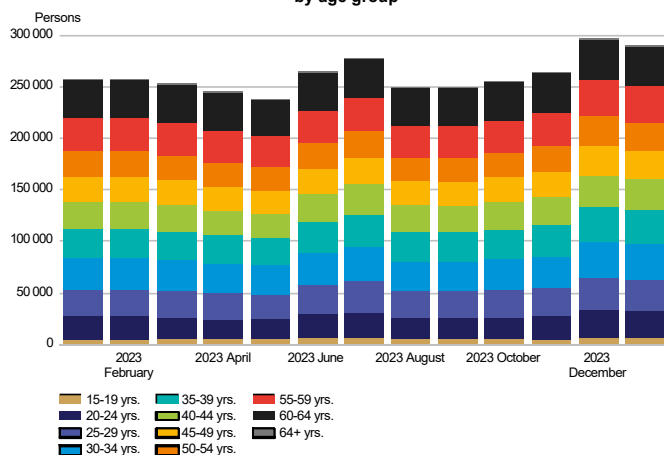
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

### Unemployment increased more among men than women

Of the unemployed jobseekers, 176,700 (61%) were men and 114,400 (39%) were women, indicating a decrease of 2,300 for men and 4,200 for women from the figures for December. Compared with January a year ago, unemployment increased by 24,600 (16%) among men and by 8,500 (8%) among women.

by age group**



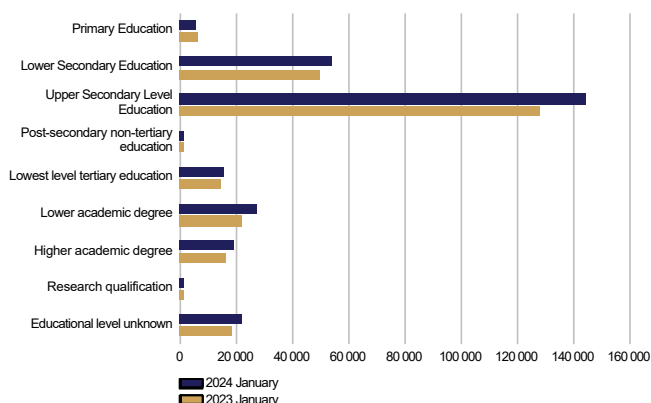
### Unemployment increased in all age groups

At the end of January, unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age numbered 32,200, representing an increase of 4,800 from January a year ago. Youth unemployment decreased from December by 1,200. For those under 20, the number of unemployed was 6,400. The number of unemployed aged over 50 was 102,800, showing an increase of 7,300 on the year before. The number of unemployed aged over 55 was 75,500, representing an increase of 5,400 on the year before. Unemployment increased in all age groups, the most among those under 20 (25%) and those over 64 years of age (20%). Compared with December, unemployment decreased in all age groups; the most among those under 20 (-14%).



## Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group

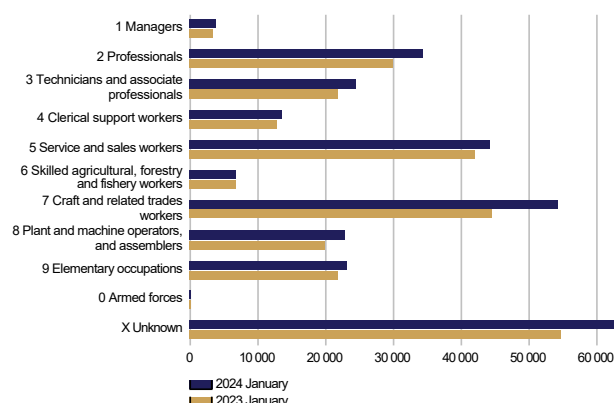
UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

### Unemployment decreased at only one level of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment decreased from January of last year at only one level of education; those with lower level basic qualifications (-12%). Unemployment increased the most among those with lower-degree level tertiary education (25%), post-secondary non-tertiary education (21%), higher-degree level tertiary education (19%) and education level unknown (19%).

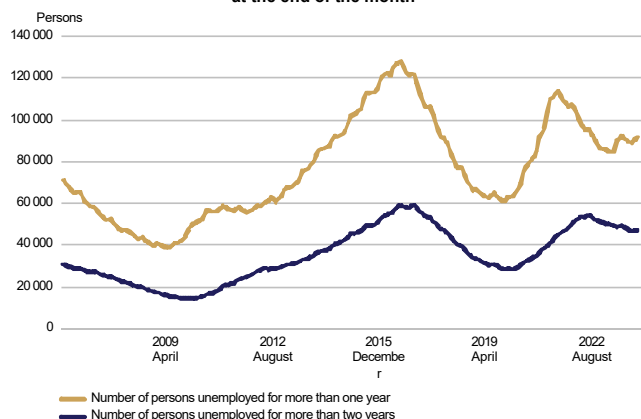
UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

### Unemployment increased in almost all occupations

Examined by occupation, unemployment increased in all groups from January of last year; the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (9,900), 'unknown' (8,300), professionals (4,400) and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (3,000). Unemployment remained unchanged among the armed forces as well as skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers.

at the end of the month

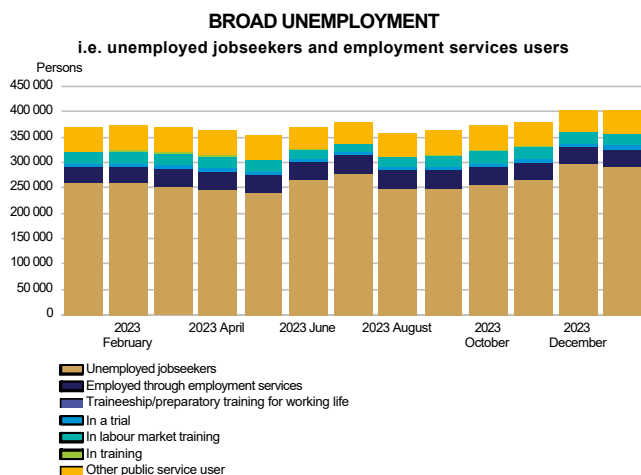


### Increase in long-term unemployment

At the end of January, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 91,700, up 5,800 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 55,200 were men and 36,400 were women. The number of men increased by 3,000 (6%) from the previous year and the number of women increased by 2,800 (8%). Long-term unemployed who have been unemployed without interruption for more than two years numbered 47,000, which is 3,400 fewer than a year ago.



## Services



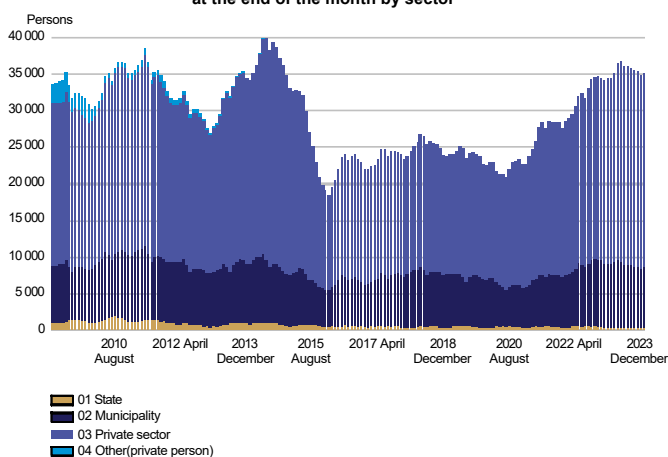
### Increase in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of January, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 113,400, up 1,900 on the previous year. Compared with December, the number of persons covered by such services increased by 6,700. Of those covered by services, 67,800 were customers of the local government pilots, which is 4,600 more than in January last year. The activation rate at the end of January was 28.0%, which is 2.2 percentage points lower than a year earlier. In all, 4.1% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 54,500, up 1,500 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 58,900, up 400 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 404,500 at the end of January. This is 35,000 more than a year earlier. The increase in broad unemployment was due to an increase in the number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services.

### The number of placements increased in the private sector

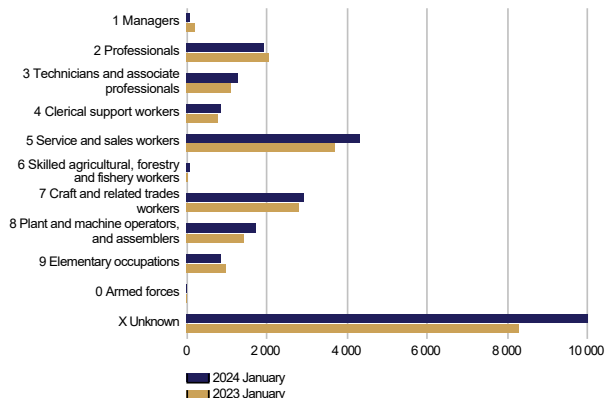
At the end of January, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the central government or receiving start-up grants totalled 35,100, which is 900 more than the year before. Of those employed, 1% were in central government jobs, 24% in municipal jobs and 75% in the private sector. Since January last year, the number of placements had increased by 6% in the private sector, but decreased by 39% in central government and by 4% in municipalities. Of those in placements, 53% were men. Placements for men increased by 700, and those for women by 200 from the previous year.

in target profession at the end of the month

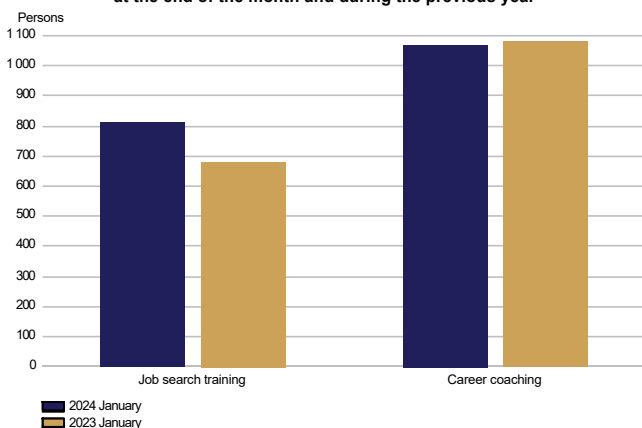


### Increase in the number of persons in labour market training

At the end of January, labour market training was attended by 24,000 students, up 2,700 on the previous year. Of the students, 11,000 were men and 13,000 were women. The number of men increased by 1,400, and the number of women by 1,300 compared to January in the previous year. During January, 5,900 new students began labour market training, representing a decrease of 400 on the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' were people in integration training (9,400), which is 1,800 more than the year before.

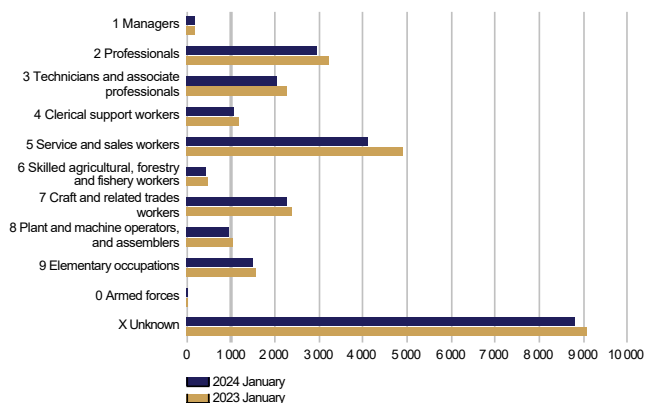
**IN TRAINING**

### The number of persons in training increased

At the end of January, 1,900 persons were in training, which is 100 more than the year before. Of those in training, 1,000 were men and 900 were women. Career coaching was provided to 1,100 participants, which is unchanged from last year. The number of people receiving job search training was 800, which is 100 more than the previous year.

in person's profession at the end of the month



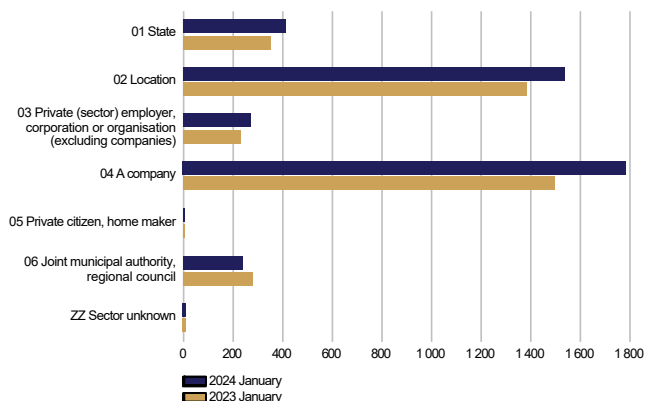
### The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year

Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 24,400 people, representing a decrease of 1,800 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 9,500, down 500 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 14,900, representing a decrease of 1,300 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 8,200 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 100 on the previous year.

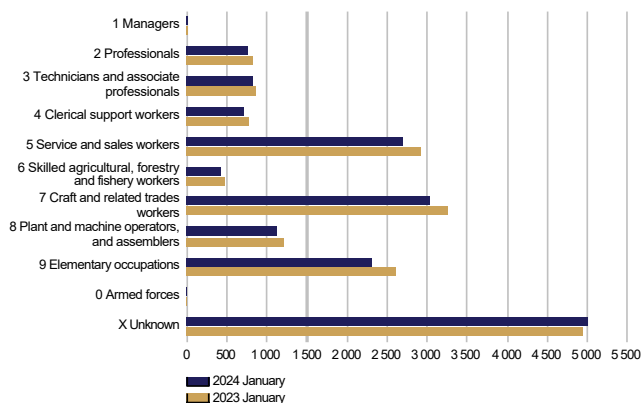
**AS A JOB ALTERNATION SUBSTITUTE**

### The number of job alternation substitutes increased

A total of 4,400 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of January, which is 600 more than a year earlier. Of the substitutes, 1,500 were men and 2,800 were women. The number of men increased by 200 and the number of women increased by 400 from the previous year.

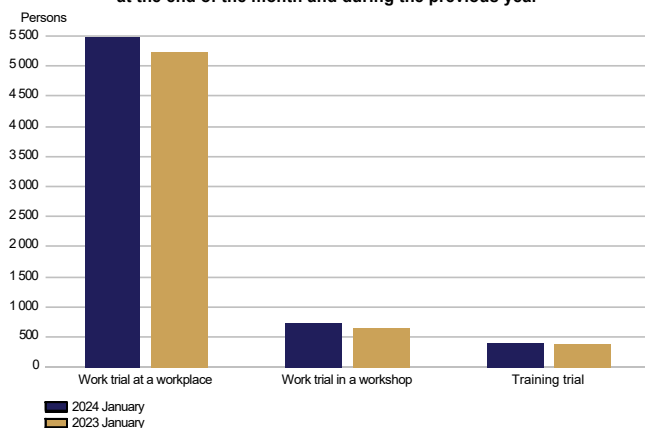
**REHABILITATIVE WORK ACTIVITIES**

### Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 16,900 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of January, which is 1,000 fewer than a year earlier. Of the participants 9,600 were men and 7,300 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 500 and the number of women also by 500.

at the end of the month and during the previous year



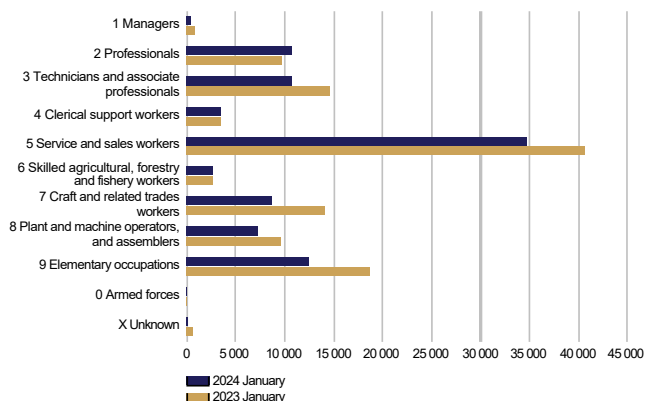
### Participation in work and training trials increased

Work and training trials had a total of 6,600 participants at the end of January, which is 400 more than the year before. Of the participants, 3,200 were men and 3,400 were women. The number of men increased by 100 and the number of women increased by 300 from the previous year.



## Jobs vacant

### Decrease in the number of new vacancies

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment during January totalled 91,200, which is 23,500 fewer than in January last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies in January was 133,400, which is 43,100 fewer than a year ago. A total of 8,500 of these vacancies were filled during January, 1,900 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 26,000 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number of applicants. In addition, a total of 13,800 vacancies were cancelled and 600 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at Employment and Economic Development Offices and in local government pilots at the end of January was 87,100, down 22,400 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had decreased for almost all occupational groups; the most in elementary occupations (-6,100), service and sales workers (-6,000), craft and related trades workers (-5,400) and technicians and associate professionals (-3,900). The number of new vacancies had increased only in the group of professionals (1,200). The number of new vacancies remained unchanged in the occupational groups of armed forces and skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers.

The Employment Bulletin is based on the data from the MEAE's Employment Service Statistics. The Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment compiles statistics on the clients of the Employment and economic development offices (TE offices), including registered job-seekers, labour market policy services, and job vacancies reported to TE offices by employers. The data is collected from the customer service registry (URA) used by the TE offices. This means that the data used by MEAE Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based. The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the aforementioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
