



February 2024



In February, 289,700 unemployed jobseekers






At the end of February, a total of 289,700 unemployed jobseekers were registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. This is 31,600 more than a year earlier. Compared with the previous month, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 1,500. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 10.8% of the labour force, which is 1.1 percentage points more than the year before. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment.

Trends:

- Total number of all jobseekers increased by 29,000
- The number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 31,600 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off increased by 11,100
- Services included in the activation rate had 500 fewer participants than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies decreased by 25,200 from the previous year




The total number of jobseekers increased

At the end of February, the number of jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 508,600, up 29,000 on the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 277,100 were men and 231,500 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men increased by 26,200 and the number of women increased by 2,800. Of the jobseekers, 264,200, or 27,300 more than a year earlier, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment.

Of the jobseekers, 111,700 were employed: 52,300 of them were in full-time work, 43,600 were in part-time work and 15,700 were employed through the services organised by the employment and economic development administration and local government pilots on employment. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 96,900, of whom 25,000 were in services promoting employment and 59,700 in training. Of the jobseekers, 289,700 were unemployed jobseekers, which is 31,600 more than the year before. In February, 35,300 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 300 more than in January. The number of people fully laid off increased by 11,100 from February a year earlier. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 10,400, representing an increase of 4,100 from the year before.


Unemployed jobseekers



Increase in unemployed jobseekers in February

At the end of February, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered at the Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment totalled 289,700, up 31,600 on the previous year. Compared with January, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased by 1,500. Of the unemployed jobseekers, 160,400, or 19,600 more than in February a year ago, were customers of municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 14,700 in February, up 1,600 from February a year ago. In February, the number of starting periods of unemployment totalled 38,300, representing an increase of 4,800 on the year before. The number of starting periods of unemployment decreased by 13,400 from January. The number of starting periods is always greater than the number of job searches because new unemployment periods are also registered from the existing groups of jobseekers.

The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 42,300, up 6,800 from February a year ago. Of these foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 11,200 at the end of February, up 1,700 from the year before.




In February, 35,300 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 300 more than in January. The number of people fully laid off increased by 11,100 from February a year earlier. In February, the number of job searches among the fully laid off people totalled 3,600, representing an increase of 600 on the year before. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs was 12,300, up 2,500 from February a year ago. The number of starting periods of full lay-offs decreased by 3,600 from January. The number of people fully laid off increased in ten occupational groups. The number of people fully laid off increased the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (5,200), "unknown" (1,600), professionals (1,300), and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (1,000). The number of laid-off people remained unchanged in the group of armed forces.


Unemployment increased in the areas of almost all ELY Centres

The number of unemployed jobseekers increased from February last year in all areas of Centres for Economic Development, Transport and the Environment (ELY Centres), with the exception of Lapland (-3%). The number of unemployed jobseekers grew the most in Pirkanmaa (26%), South Ostrobothnia (15%), Uusimaa (13%), North Ostrobothnia (12%), Häme (11%), Southwest Finland (11%) and North Savo (11%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased 2%. Compared with January, the number of unemployed jobseekers decreased in eight areas of ELY Centres, rose in two and remained unchanged in five areas. Unemployment fell the most in North Karelia (-2%) and Southwest Finland (-2%). The number of unemployed jobseekers increased in Central Finland (1%) and South Ostrobothnia (1%). The number of unemployed jobseekers remained unchanged in Åland.

Unemployment increased more among men than women


Of the unemployed jobseekers, 176,400 (61%) were men and 113,200 (39%) were women, indicating a decrease of 300 for men and 1,200 for women from the figures for January. Compared with February a year ago, unemployment increased by 23,100 (15%) among men and by 8,500 (8%) among women.

Unemployment increased in all age groups

At the end of February, unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age numbered 32,000, representing an increase of 5,000 from February a year ago. Youth unemployment decreased from January by 300. For those under 20, the number of unemployed was 6,200. Among those over 50, the number of unemployed was 102,200, representing an increase of 6,500 on the year before. Among those over 55, the number of unemployed was 74,900, representing an increase of 4,600 on the year before. Unemployment increased in all age groups; the most among these under 20 (26%), those over 64 (17%) and those between 20 and 24 years of age (17%). Compared with January, unemployment increased among those between 40 to 44 years of age (1%) and remained unchanged among those between 45 to 49 and those between 50 to 54. Unemployment fell in other age groups.


Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group



Unemployment decreased at only one level of education

Examined by level of education, unemployment decreased from February of last year at only one level of education; those with lower level basic qualifications (-13%), Unemployment increased the most among those with lower-degree level tertiary education (24%), post-secondary non-tertiary education (20%), education level unknown (19%), and higher-degree level tertiary education (18%).


UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS by occupational group



Unemployment increased in almost all occupations

Examined by occupation, unemployment increased in all groups from February of last year; the most in the groups of craft and related trades workers (9,400), 'unknown' (8,100), professionals (4,400), technicians and associate professionals (2,300), service and sales workers (2,300), and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (2,100). Unemployment remained unchanged in the group of armed forces.

LONG-TERM UNEMPLOYED




Increase in long-term unemployment


At the end of February, the number of long-term unemployed who have been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 92,200, up 7,000 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 55,500 were men and 36,700 were women. The number of men increased by 3,600 (7%) from the previous year and the number of women increased by 3,500 (10%). Long-term unemployed who have been unemployed without interruption for more than two years numbered 46,500, which is 3,500 fewer than a year ago.

Decrease in the number of persons covered by services

At the end of February, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 113,600, down 500 on the previous year. Compared with January, the number of persons covered by such services increased by 200. Of those covered by services, 69,500 were customers of the local government pilots, which is 4,400 more than in February last year. The activation rate at the end of February was 28.2%, which is 2.4 percentage points lower than a year earlier. In all, 4.0% of the labour force were covered by these services.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 55,000, up 700 on the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 58,500, down 1,200 on the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 403,200 at the end of February. This is 31,100 more than a year earlier. The growth in broad unemployment was due to the increase in unemployed jobseekers.


The number of placements increased in the private sector

At the end of February, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies, employed by the State or receiving start-up grants totalled 35,300, which is 900 more than the year before. Of those employed, 1% were in central government jobs, 24% in municipal jobs and 75% in the private sector. Since February last year, the number of placements had increased by 5% in the private sector, but decreased by 39% in central government and by 4% in municipalities. Of those in placements, 53% were men. Placements for men increased by 700, and for women by 200 from the previous year.

in target profession at the end of the month




Increase in the number of persons in labour market training

At the end of February, labour market training was attended by 25,100 students, up 2,500 on the previous year. Of the students, 11,600 were men and 13,500 were women. The number of men increased by 1,300, and the number of women by 1,200 from February last year. During February, 4,800 new students began labour market training, which is the same number as the year before.

Based on target occupation, the largest subgroup within the category of 'unknown' were people in integration training (9,800), which is 1,600 more than the year before.

at the end of the month and during the previous year




The number of persons in training decreased

At the end of February, 1,800 persons were in training, which is 100 less than the year before. Of those in training, 1,000 were men and 800 were women. Career coaching was provided to 1,000 participants, which is 200 less than a year earlier. The number of people receiving job search training was 800, which is 100 more than the previous year.

The number of people in self-motivated study decreased from the previous year


Self-motivated studies supported by unemployment benefits were attended by a total of 25,000 people, representing a decrease of 1,500 on the year before. The number of men receiving unemployment benefits for studies was 9,800, down 300 on the previous year. Among women, the number was 15,200, representing a decrease of 1,200 on the year before. Occupation was undetermined in case of 8,400 persons in the group of 'unknown', down 100 on the previous year.

The number of job alternation substitutes decreased

A total of 1,900 persons were job alternation substitutes at the end of February, which is 1,800 less than a year earlier. Of the substitutes, 600 were men and 1,200 were women. The number of men decreased by 700 and the number of women by 1,100 from the previous year.

at the end of the month and during the previous year




Fewer participants in rehabilitative work activities than in the previous year

A total of 17,400 persons participated in rehabilitative work activities at the end of February, which is 700 less than a year earlier. Of the participants 9,800 were men and 7,600 were women. Compared to the situation a year ago, the number of men decreased by 400 and the number of women also by 400.

Participation in work and training trials increased

Work and training trials had a total of 7,000 participants at the end of February, which is 300 more than the year before. Of the participants, 3,500 were men and 3,600 were women. The number of men increased by 100 and the number of women increased by 200 from the previous year.

Decrease in the number of new vacancies

The number of new vacancies reported to Employment and Economic Development Offices and municipalities participating in the local government pilots on employment during February totalled 66,700, which is 25,200 fewer than in February last year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies in February was 151,400, which is 46,900 fewer than a year ago. A total of 10,300 of these vacancies were filled during February, 2,900 of them through Employment and Economic Development Offices. A total of 38,000 vacancies were closed for applications because the application period had ended or because there was a sufficient number of applicants. In addition, a total of 23,800 vacancies were cancelled and 500 vacancies could not be filled. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at Employment and Economic Development Offices and in local government pilots at the end of February was 85,100, down 28,000 on the previous year.

The number of new vacancies had decreased in all occupational groups; the most in the groups of service and sales workers (-8,000), professionals (-5,200), elementary occupations (-3,500), craft and related trades workers (-3,200) and plant and machine operators, and assemblers (-1,900).

Information about the website

On this website you will find the latest statistics from the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment's monthly Employment Bulletin. You can access a .pdf version of the current and previous months' Employment Bulletin by following the link on the right. The Employment Bulletin is based on the data from the MEAE's Employment Service Statistics. The Ministry of Economic Affairs and Employment compiles statistics on the clients of the Employment and economic development offices (TE offices), including registered job-seekers, labour market policy services, and job vacancies reported to TE offices by employers. The data is collected from the customer service registry (URA) used by the TE offices. This means that the data used by MEAE Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based. The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the aforementioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
